FEMA did respond and worked with the community to get through many issues we all faced. This year we even "adopted" a few DPS Troopers and one officer from Luling, Texas, who came to volunteer his assistance.

At the completion of another year, I must say I am extremely proud of the work of the men and women of the police department, especially because most know the residents they serve and work within neighborhoods to solve problems and improve relationships and safety. COMMAND STAFF





Assistant Chief Dixie Brzozowski

The Assistant Chief provides assistance to the Chief in the daily operations of the department. Not only does she sit in for the Chief when he's away, she prepares the annual budget for approval by the chief and the city; she oversees the department's agreement with the Texas Police Chiefs Association to ensure the department's policies and procedures remain current with law and the adopted best practices of the Texas Police Chiefs Association' Recognition Program; and she works closely with remaining command staff and other City departments on many day to day issues and projects.



Lieutenant Jesse Martin - Operations Division

Lt. Martin oversees the Department's Operations Division. Operations is made up of the men and women of the department who wear the uniform and answer calls for service. Operations consist of beat officers and each beat is assigned an officer who is responsible for making those vital contacts with members of each area in the city in an effort to work on problems together. Each month each officer is tasked with making three contacts with new residents in their beats in order to introduce themselves and answer any questions about the police department they may have.

Operations is considered the "Backbone" of any police agency. It is the men and women on the street who respond to calls for service and act as the eyes and ears for the agency.

Lieutenant Martin ensures each shift has sufficient manpower to provide services and conduct proactive patrols in order to cite or arrest law breakers and look for problems which need to be addressed at an early stage to prevent crime.



Lieutenant Diana Butinski - Criminal Investigation Division

Lieutenant Butinski oversees the day to day operations of the police department's criminal investigation division (detectives). There are three detectives under her command who investigate major and minor crimes. Lieutenant Butinski assigns cases for follow up, assists with investigations and works some cases herself. She also oversees the department's Crime Scene Unit, which consist of two highly trained civilian employees. During the calendar year 2017 Lt. Butinski was also tasked with developing a procedural manual for CID.

COMMAND STAFF





Lieutenant Lowell Neinast - Support Services Division

Lt. Neinast wears many hats for the Richmond Texas Police Department. He is tasked with recruiting and processing applicants for police officer positions, as well as telecommunicators (9-1-1 dispatchers). Lt. Neinast maintains all training files for all officers in compliance with the State regulatory commission, the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. He is best known as the department's Public Information Officer, the coordinator for the Citizens Police Academy, and acts as the City's official Easter Bunny each year. He carries out all of the above duties and many more.



Lieutenant Donnie Kovar - Communications and Records

Lt. Kovar oversees the department's communication division which consist of 8 telecommunicators. These men and women answer all 911 calls for police and fire, dispatched calls to officers in the field, provide information requested by officers in the field and man the department's front desk at the police station. Lt. Kovar is also tasked with assisting the city's Emergency Management director during situations such as severe weather or other emergency operations.

The program aims to advance the practice of community policing through improving relationships between police officers and community members one cup of coffee at a time.
