

A critical component of implementing our vision is to make sure we have the water and sewer infrastructure in place to support the addition of new residents without impacting the quality of life our current residents enjoy. To that end, Richmond's City Commission adopted a Utility Master Plan that integrates with the City's Comprehensive Master Plan to help guide our investment in infrastructure as our City continues to grow over the next 10 years.

Last year we celebrated the opening of our brand-new Surface Water Treatment Plant. The new treatment plant can treat up to 2 million gallons of water per day and as our demand for water increases, will help reduce our reliance on our finite groundwater resources. We built the new treatment plant to provide the drinking water we need today, but designed it with the capacity to expand as we grow.

Looking forward, the Utility Master Plan identifies a critical need to expand wastewater treatment infrastructure. Demand for sewer services is expected to increase to more than three times current service levels over the next 10 years. Much like our Surface Water

the existing Regional

project is scheduled to
begin in 2024. However,

begin in 2024. However, to accommodate the scale of predicted demand, we are also planning to construct a new wastewater treatment plant within the next decade to help us maintain dependable service levels and preserve our healthy, clean environment.


Monthly water bill payments ensure our ability 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to deliver high quality, water and sewer services in a manner that values our environment, community and economic interests, and sustains the resources entrusted to our care. Our utility rates are based on the cost to deliver drinking water and take wastewater away to be treated. No tax revenue is used to provide utility services.

we plan for the long term, our City Commission carefully assesses every investment we make in our water and sewer system to ensure that growth pays its way and meets our community's vision. In April, the Commission adopted the 2019 rate changes necessary to maintain existing operations and begin funding the repairs and upgrades recommended in the master plan. Changes include a 3 percent increase for water services, a 10 percent increase for wastewater and a 10 percent increase to the surface water charge. A bill increase of approximately \$4.70 is expected for the average residential customer using 5000 gallons of water per month.

In 2019, we are investing \$3.7 million in upgrades to our water and sewer systems, replacing aging pump stations, water storage tanks and pipelines and expanding our capacity to produce reclaimed water to supplement our surface water supply and support ongoing efforts to reduce reliance on our finite ground water resources.

## Commercial Growth and Tourism Bring Hotels to Richmond

# Visitors from around the region have discovered the unique cultural amenities and historic charm that make Richmond a prime destination for tourism.

Nearby destinations, such as Brazos Bend State Park, George Ranch Historical Park and the Fort Bend Museum, as well as an abundance of unique restaurants and shops in Richmond's historic downtown have created a location where visitors are able to have a full-day experience. Historically, visitors to Richmond were unable to spend the night in our community and patronized hotels in nearby communities.

Visitors are now able to include an overnight stay in Richmond to their itinerary. In January, Richmond welcomed its first hotel when the 83 room and 51,000 square foot La Quinta Inn & Suites opened its doors to the public. The property offers modern amenities and a convenient location for both visitors seeking to explore our community and visiting family members of existing residents seeking a convenient location nearby.

Two additional hotels are in development with plans to open in 2019. Hilton's Home2 Suites is planned for a summer opening at Pointe West Circle along IH 69, and a Marriott Fairfield Inn is slated for a fall 2019 opening at the intersection of Richmond Parkway and IH 69.

This recent hotel development provides a direct benefit to Richmond residents as well as visitors to our city. Cities around Texas levy a hotel occupancy tax on overnight stays that take place in hotels within their jurisdiction. The City of Richmond's hotel occupancy tax rate of 7% is directly in-line with the majority of communities around the state and helps to provide funding for several key purposes. These uses include promoting activities that bring new visitors to Richmond, promoting the

arts, funding historical preservation efforts, creating transportation systems for tourists, the creation of wayfinding signage, and funding convention center activities.

A key benefit

of the construction of these hotel facilities is the large positive economic impact created by capturing the hotel night stays of these visitors. Visitors who stay in Richmond are more likely to bring in dollars from outside of our community to spend at local restaurants, shops, and entertainment venues. This activity helps to bolster our local economy and create economic opportunity for local residents.







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### Recent Legislative Session Passes Bill to Benefit Richmond

With direction from the city's Comprehensive Master Plan, the City of Richmond pursued the passage of special legislation that will help to facilitate the development of a mixed use center comprised of retail shopping, restaurants, hotel space, and entertainment space.

House Bill 4347 was successfully passed and signed by Governor Greg Abbott on June 14th, 2019. The bill provides the City of Richmond with a new economic development tool. The legislation specifically allows for a 10 year rebate of the state's share of hotel taxes, sales taxes, and mixed-beverage taxes generated within a 1,000 foot radius of a newly constructed hotel and convention center project. This performance based tool provides an outside funding source that will help to pay for key infrastructure improvements, such as drainage and roadways, as well as other amenities tied to a future hotel and convention center anchored development. The legislation will become effective on September 1st, 2019 and the City of Richmond will have until September 1st, 2022 to enter into a development agreement that utilizes this economic development tool. The legislation is not tied to a specific location and the City of Richmond will work diligently to select a developer and project location that best meets the needs of our community.







#### Fire Station 2 Ready Toward End of 2019

Fire Station 2 on Richmond Parkway and Ransom Road is really forming an identity!

The new fire station is designed to support our existing fire stations which cover more than 50 square miles. Our stations provide service agreements to many growing communities outside our City limits that depend on the City of Richmond for emergency services. Richmond's fire services cover from Regal Cinema on the Grand Parkway in Long Meadow Farms to Grand Parkway @ Hwy 90; to area around George Ranch High School on FM 2759 and northwest to FM 359 and FM 723.
