The City Commission for the City of Richmond, Texas met in Workshop Session on December 21, 2020 at 9:00 a.m.

Mayor Becky Haas proceeded to call the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m. via video conference pursuant to Texas Government Code, Section 551.125, as amended, and as modified by the temporary suspension of various provisions thereof effective March 16, 2020, by the Governor of Texas in accordance with the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, all as related to the Governor's proclamation on March 13, 2020, certifying that the COVID-19 pandemic poses an imminent threat of disaster and declaring a state of disaster for all counties in Texas. All members of the public may participate in the meeting via video conference call.

A quorum was present, with the following members in attendance:

Mayor Haas introduced agenda item A2, Review and discuss agenda items on the **December 21, 2020 Regular City Commission Meeting.**

Agenda item A1. Call to order, Quorum Determined and Meeting Declared Open.

Agenda item A2. Discuss and recite Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation. There was a lengthy conversation regarding the guidelines for invocation and who would provide the invocation. Everyone provided their opinions and concerns. It was noted that all forms of groups would be allowed to provide prayers and the City should be prepared for small religious denominations, agnostic organizations and atheist groups. Mayor and Commission were favorable of reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

Agenda item A3. Presentations:

- a. Employee Recognition for Service with the City of Richmond:
 - 1. Howard Christian, 5 years of service, Assistant City Manager/Public Works Department,
 - 2. Gary Smith, 5 years of service, City Attorney.

- b. Presentation and update of the Comprehensive Master Plan. Mayor Haas had various questions regarding infrastructure and detention issues at small developments. Also, the lack of communications and continuity from citizens with smaller projects. Historic Preservation needs to be enforced and a park proposed at Seguin School moved forward. There were no further comments from the Commissioners.
- c. Presentation on a New City Hall. Commissioner Beard expressed concerns of raising property taxes. Commissioner Drozd stated that any bond that raised taxes would need to be voted on by the citizens. Mayor Haas stated that the other departments within the City had been provided new facilities and taken care of except for City Hall. "The employees are very crowded", stated Mayor Haas. City Manager Vela stated that CoVid had made us more aware of the close proximity and has been challenging.
- d. Presentation on Sidewalk Assessment and Implementation of Plan. Mayor Haas stated there had been a letter to the editor in the Fort Bend Herald regarding the sidewalks especially in the downtown.

Agenda item A4. Public Comments. There were no citizens signed up to speak therefore, the agenda item was closed. **No comments.**

Agenda item A5. Public hearing to receive comments for or against text amendments to the Unified Development Code to revise land use allowance and site development requirements pertaining to animal boarding and veterinarian services for small animals (Pet boarding facilities); The specific sections include:

- 1) Table 2.2.203, Commercial Limited and Conditional Use Standards

Agenda item A6. CONSENT AGENDA

A6. 1. Minutes – Special, Regular and Workshop for November 9 and 16, 2020.

A6. 2. Fire Department Report

Commissioner Beard inquired what type of burning is permitted in the City. Chief Youngblood stated fires within fire pits or barbeque pits. No brush or burning on the ground is allowed. Commissioner Beard stated the calls were consistent through shifts and stations. The Fire Department level of training is impressive. Commissioner Drozd inquired if the City owned a drone and it was stated that they do and have a licensed operator. Mayor Haas indicated the importance of the Fire Marshal and Deputy Fire Marshal and encouraged the need to replace the former Fire Marshal Albert Cantu quickly. Mayor Haas also expressed the concern regarding the inspectors that are leaving the City. City Manager Vela stated the inspectors are under the Permits Department within Development Services. The Mayor will be provided an organization chart for reference.

A6. 3. Police Department Report

Commissioner Beard requested an explanation of the decline in arrests from 2019. Chief Craig stated the change in the way crimes are reported is making it difficult to compare 2019 to 2020. Also, CoVid has had an impact, not with any written policy, but out of consideration and caution. The lesser crimes were not arrested lessening the jail population. Commissioner Beard also made enquiries about the training of the Police Department. Mayor Haas commended the Chief for the new officers. It was requested if the Department has noticed multiple accidents at

certain locations. Chief Craig stated he would look at the accidents as well as the traffic patterns at Jane Long Elementary School.

A6. 4. Municipal Court Department Report

Commissioner BeMent inquired as to the indication that warrants would begin being issued last month and the report stated zero warrants were issued in November 2020. Court Coordinator Carol Trujillo stated that staff is attempting to contact offenders and allow for a second chance. Staff is required to allow first time offenders another opportunity. The process has been started.

A6. 5. Tax Assessor/Collector Report

A6. 6. Monthly Financial Report

Commissioner Beard inquired as to expenditures being less than what was budgeted. Also, the Utility Fund continues to be lag causing concern. Finance Director Justin reviewed the General Fund and Utility Fund with the Commission providing them explanations. Finance Director Alderete indicated the Cares Act funds that had been allocated to the City have been exhausted.

A6. 7. Public Works Report

Mayor Haas inquired what the term "cut-off" means and noted there were 110 in November. Assistant City Manager Howard Christian explained water is cut off for notice of end of service and/or non-payment. Finance Director Alderete stated the City makes every effort to work with the customer, offering payment plans, text messaging, alerts to cut offs. There was a discussion regarding the water tower rehab and also the traffic cones on Foster Drive being dangerous. Commissioner BeMent inquired about the convenience store on the north side with fresh produce and also why the Historical Commission didn't have a meeting in December. It was stated by Planning Director Jose Abraham that the Historical Commission did not have a quorum due to conflicting schedules and also no action items to consider. The convenience store is seeking a conditional use permit due to rezoning.

A6. 8. Planning Department Report

Mayor Haas expressed her displeasure with the Anchor Bend Church moving to the former Tractor Supply location on FM 2218. The main concerns are traffic issues and parking. There was a lengthy discussion on this item.

A6. 9. Building Department Report

A6. 10.Code Enforcement Report

Commissioner Beard had concerns or questions regarding the report and which items are open and resolved. It was asked, "how do we enforce once the permits have been issued". Code Compliance Supervisor Scott Fajkus who is new to the position, reported that updates are being made to a new system called Iworks and assured the Commission that progress is being made to revamp the report and focus is being placed on the older open violations. It was noted the next Building & Standards Commission meeting will be held January 25th. Mayor Haas stated she "has a lot of confidence in you in this new position". Mayor Haas also expressed her appreciation for the map that was included in the report reflecting the locations of the violations.

A6. 11. Emergency Management Report

- A6. 12.Review and consider taking action on a Preliminary Plat OSP NW 359 Reserve "A" 4.3164 acres of land 0 Lots 1 Block 1 Reserve. The subject site is located on the west side of Mason Road, south of City of Richmond Fire Station 3.
- Commissioner Gaul inquired whether the City will be receiving sales tax from this property with regards to where it is located. City Planner Abraham stated the 4.3164 is located in the city limits of Richmond and zoned General Commercial.
- A6. 13. Review and consider taking action on a Preliminary Plat Veranda Section Thirty-Eight 22.8 acres of land 58 Lots 2 Blocks 4 Reserves. The subject site is a section with Veranda master planned community.

Commissioner Gaul inquired about the contours that are reflected for Lots 1-7 on the Plat making them unusable. Planning Director Abraham stated the Plat reflect the existing Lots, not as they are proposed. There are existing ponds but will be filled when the infrastructure is completed.

Commissioner Gaul stated there are three lots being combined into two lots and are restricted to residential use. Planning Director Abraham confirmed the statement was correct and added the Homeowners Association has deed restrictions and enforce the use of the lots.

Commissioner Gaul and Drozd spoke on the item expressing concern if the noise restrictions would be adequate and if sound barrier building materials were being required. Planning Director Abraham stated that boarding facilities have changed over the years and that consideration for different zoning designations and consideration for adjoining properties were all being contemplated.

Agenda item A9. Review and consider taking action on Resolution No. 349-2020, appointment of Planning & Zoning Commission members.

City Manager Vela indicated that the Board Member Ernie Hogue has requested to step down due to health reasons. Commissioner Beard affirmed that Mr. Hogue was the first member of the original Charter Committee to suggest zoning and has been a valuable asset to the City over the years. Commissioner Gaul spoke regarding this item stating the Planning & Zoning Board is one of considerable importance and the members selected should be reviewed with additional scrutiny. Having alternates and then moving them up to positions was discussed along with creating a pool that contains applicants that have been trained in a leadership program. Amending the Rules of Commission as to how applicants are appointed or chosen was conversed.

Agenda item A10. Review and consider taking action on Resolution No. 350-2020, appointing a member to the Fort Bend Subsidence District.

Commissioner Gaul asked if there was feedback on his performance with the Subsidence District. City Manager Vela indicated that Mr. Karl Baumgartner has served on the board for many years and provides an excellent voice for the City of Richmond. The Board consists of 12 members with representatives for all the surrounding cities. City Manager Vela stated Mr. Baumgartner has expressed the desire to continue to serve. Commissioner Beard indicated it would be helpful to have Mr. Baumgartner attend a Commission meeting. Commissioner Beard also stated he has served with him on other boards and is a very intelligent individual.

Agenda item A11. Review and consider taking action on scheduling a workshop meeting to review and discuss City Charter and Commission Rules of Procedure. It was proposed to have a workshop to discuss the rules, proposed changes and refresher of the rules. There was a brief discussion.

Agenda item A12. Review and consider taking action on Resolution No. 351-2020 approving an extension of the Agreement Concerning Provision of Garbage Collection Services with MUD 187.

City Manager Vela provided the background stating the garbage contract has been in effect for a number of years and is expiring April 30, 2021. The purpose of this resolution is to extend the Del Webb MUD 187 contract due to it expiring before the provider contract, allowing all parties to be aligned. The City will be reaching out for bids insuring a more robust contract with updated services. There were various Commissioner comments and direction.

Agenda item A13. Review and consider taking action on awarding an Engineering contract for the North Richmond Water Line Replacement Project through the Fort Bend County Community Development Block Grant, Phase XII.

Commissioner Gaul inquired about the scoring process of the bids with several questions. Assistant City Manager Christian indicated for professional services, only qualifications are received, not proposals. ACM Christian stated that all nine bidders could perform the project, however it is based on what vendor went the extra mile with pictures, surveys but all meet the minimum qualifications. Commissioner Beard questioned the process of soliciting bids and the analyzation process. City Manager Vela stated that CDBG funds can only be used in specific areas of the City that are eligible.

Agenda item A14. Review and consider taking action on awarding an Engineering contract for the Clay Street Drainage Improvement and Sidewalk Project.

Commission Gaul inquired what were the remaining funds from Phase I. ACM Christian stated there was \$200,000 remaining that was applied to this project. The remainder of the funding will be through a County Mobility Bond, second request from the Foundation and inline grant funding. Commissioner Drozd requested that drainage be considered for future development of the Proler property. ACM Christian stated drainage studies have been completed and plans made for future development.

Agenda item A15. Review and consider taking action on Resolution No. 352-2020 approving Interlocal Agreement with Fort Bend County on FM 762/10th Street Improvement. Mayor Haas stated the information was very difficult to understand and read, requesting a workshop with the Richmond Commission and the County Commissioners. City Manager Vela provided the history of the proposed project dating back to 2010. Property has been purchased on FM 762. The concerns were that the negotiations and discussions occurred prior to the election of the current Mayor and Commissioners. Commissioner Gaul suggested an executive summary be created to provide guidance. Commissioner Drozd advocated for the movement forward of the Interlocal Agreement to maintain momentum and control. There was a lengthy discussion with numerous comments and concerns.

Agenda item A16. Review and consider taking action on Ordinance No. 2020-31 abandoning a portion of 3rd Street to Fort Bend County.

There were concerns expressed from the Commission with regards to this item that coincided with agenda item A15.

Agenda item A17. Review and consider taking action on Ordinance No. 2020-26, establishing regulations of the placement and maintenance of donation boxes. Commissioner Gaul stated the document is significantly better than the earlier drafts with one concern that the process from violation to revoking permit is adequate. There was a brief discussion.

Agenda item A18. Review and consider taking action on Consulting Agreement to assist us on legislative activity.

City Manager Vela provided the background of the need for the legislative consultant and that he was active with the hotel legislation in 2019. Commissioner Gaul requested language for a termination clause and accountability. Commissioner Beard requested to interface with Mr. Marcell to provide guidance. Commissioner Drozd requested payment clarification with regards to expenses, conflict of interest language and clarification of who directs the consultant to avoid conflicting direction. That being the City Manager or the Mayor and Commission.

Agenda item A19. Excuse from Attendance at Regular City Commission Meeting.

Agenda item A20. Consider taking action on requests for future agenda items.

Before adjournment, City Manager Vela requested Building Official Lori Bownds to provide the answer that was posed earlier in the meeting to Mayor Haas regarding the permitting by the County for demolition of the EMS Building. Building Official Bownds stated the County did obtain a demolition permit for the existing EMS Building.

With no further business to discuss, Mayor Haas declared the meeting adjourned at 1:02 p.m.

Mayor Becky Haas proceeded to call the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m. via video conference pursuant to Texas Government Code, Section 551.125, as amended, and as modified by the temporary suspension of various provisions thereof effective March 16, 2020, by the Governor of Texas in accordance with the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, all as related to the Governor's proclamation on March 13, 2020, certifying that the COVID-19 pandemic poses an imminent threat of disaster and declaring a state of disaster for all counties in Texas. All members of the public may participate in the meeting via video conference call.

Mayor Haas introduced agenda item A2, Discuss and recite Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation. Commissioner BeMent made the motion to postpone agenda item A2 until the January 19th meeting for further discussion and to receive additional information. Commissioner Beard seconded the motion.

Agenda item A3. Presentations:

- a. Employee Recognition for Service with the City of Richmond:
 - 1. Howard Christian, 5 years of service, Assistant City Manager/Public Works Department,
 - 2. Gary Smith, 5 years of service, City Attorney.

Mayor Haas recognized both Howard Christian and Gary Smith, thanking them for their service to the City.

b. Presentation and update of the Comprehensive Master Plan.

Planning Director Jose Abraham provided the presentation. The Plan was adopted in 2014 and over the past six years, the City has used it as a guide for the future of our community. The top six action steps; annexation, land development regulations, mobility, neighborhoods and amenities, business support, and ongoing essential municipal functions were reviewed. In the future, staff will research options to conduct public engagement exercises using virtual platforms for listening sessions and focus group discussions if gatherings continue to be restricted. There was a brief question and answer period and the item was closed.

c. Presentation on a New City Hall.

City Manager Vela introduced Assistant City Manager Christian to discuss the proposed City Hall. Based on a 2016 needs assessment study, between the current City Hall and the City Hall Annex, there is a total of 13,000 sq. ft. At that time, the existing need was projected to be 19,000 sq. ft. The anticipation for 2025 is 24,000 sq. ft. It would allow for growth of staff and for the citizens to conduct their transactions under one roof. Finance Director Justin Alderete stated that in 2018, the estimated project cost was \$14 million with land purchases at \$2 million. For discussion, \$20 million would be the projected cost, Finance Director Alderete reviewed the annual debt service and net taxable value. The total required taxable value is estimated to be \$769.5 million. This would require a \$0.21 cents property tax rate increase or to offset the tax increase a new assessed value of \$179.5 million. The Commission stated the price is only going to increase over time and that the needs are there. The general consensus was to be creative with the financing with the least impact to the citizens and to begin a solid plan to begin the process.

d. Presentation on Sidewalk Assessment and Implementation of Plan. City Manager Vela introduced Assistant City Manager Christian to provide the status of the City sidewalks. It was also stated the press release in December was triggered by an article in the newspaper warranting a response. In 2018, the City's Street Department took over the process of repairing or replacing the City sidewalks. Since then, 2,200 linear feet of sidewalk has been repaired or replaced. Also 6,700 linear feet were constructed on Collins Road. There are three categories of priorities with the top being a trip hazard of greater than two inches. All the priorities were determined based on safety, not aesthetics. With regard to the downtown sidewalks, there are a lot of cracks and sub slab on top of very old material. There are several concerns to be considered. One option that has been discussed, is on Third Street where there is a significant drop-off, installing handrails for safety. There is also the timing issue with the downtown merchants coordinating the work so as not to interrupt the flow of business. There was a brief discussion with the Commission with Assistant City Manager Christian indicating the Street Department is very close to moving to the second tier of sidewalk priorities.

Agenda item A4. Public Comments. There were no citizens signed up to speak therefore, the agenda item was closed.

This project is Phase 2 of a 3-step process. The funding is the balance of the grant received from the Wessendorff Foundation in the amount of \$2 million. 





Description of Beat:

Beat 1 is a residential area located on the far north end of the City. The boundaries are all residences between Collins Road and Jenny Lane, as well as everything north of Clay Street, up to and including George Park. There is a convenience store commonly known as Heights Mini Mart, addressed as 1308 Clay Street. Texana Center, which is a non-profit behavioral healthcare facility, is also located in Beat 1 and is addressed as 1818 Collins Road.

Narrative:

Description of Beat:

Beat 2 is also known as "Brazos Terrace Subdivision" and it is located in the north side of the City of Richmond. The boundary lines are west of Collins, South of Pink Blvd, north of the Union Pacific Railroad, and east of the Richmond State School (which is outside the City Limits and Beat Two). Beat 2 is mainly a residential area, working class family residences mixed with several single wide mobile home parks. Within Beat 2, Pink Elementary (Lamar Consolidated School District) and Baker-Rilley preschool are also located. There is a convenience store located at 611 Pultar and a gas station/convenience store at 205 Collins Road. Beat 2 is home to 3 apartment complexes, 1930 Rocky Falls, 2020 Rocky Falls and 1001 Pultar Road.

Narrative:

During the holidays I met with Robert Solis and Moe Rivera, who are neighbors on Rochelle Street. We spoke about Christmas and time off from work. I also met David Lopez, who is a long-time resident of Mellon Street and owns a small roofing company. We spoke about crime and some of his family members.

I travelled through Beat 2 and discovered three vehicles that were not in compliance with the City of Richmond Junk Vehicle Ordinance had been removed from 1800 Preston #41 and #29. Under the same ordinance written notices were left at 316 Mellon, 2000 Gammon, 2003 Gammon, and 2010 Gammon.

Following up on my November contact with Mr. Armstrong, I travelled to his residence of Branch Street. Mr. Armstrong was not home but I noticed that Mr. Armstrong had purchased temporary paper plates for the vehicles that were not in compliance.

Since 1996 I have been involved with the "Santa Behind the Badge" Christmas family charity program sponsored by the Richmond Police Department. However, for the last fifteen years a wealthy business owner, who chooses to remain anonymous, purchases groceries for some of the families selected for this Christmas project. Despite that the Christmas event was postponed I acted as a liaison between two families and the anonymous business owner.

I was able to do the monthly check on the two registered sex offenders within Beat 2 (Mr. Gentry and Mr. Davis). I also continued the business checks within Beat 2 that allowed me to visit, at a safe distance, with some of the Beat residents



Introduction

The following monthly financial report for the City of Richmond provides an overview of the City's financial position as of a point in time. This report details activity in the respective funds and where appropriate highlights key statistical information that may help indicate trends impacting financial condition. Information in this report is through December 31, 2020, which represents 25.0% of the 2021 fiscal year.

Property Tax (General Fund & Debt Service)

Property tax is allocated between both the General Fund and the Debt Service Fund. Property tax collections total \$1,554,641.57 through the period, which represents 38.15% of total adjusted current year tax levy. The City budgeted \$4,161,585 in property tax collections, which includes, current, delinquent and penalty and interest (this represents a 98% collection rate). Taxes become delinquent on February 1st and are assessed six percent for first month or portion of month, plus 1 percent for each additional month delinquent. Taxes unpaid after July 1st will be assessed (12%) for penalty and interest and the percentage stops increasing.

General Fund Summary

The General Fund is a governmental fund type and is the primary operating fund for the City. The General Fund accounts for all activity not accounted for in another fund type.

Summary of Revenues

In the General Fund, revenues total \$4,898,347 through the period, which is 29.0% of budget. Projects for CARES Act funding have been submitted to Fort Bend County for reimbursement. It's anticipated that funding will be received within the second quarter of fiscal year 2021 at which point a budget amendment will be presented to appropriate carryover funding from FY20.

Sales Tax

Sales tax is the largest revenue stream in the General Fund, but it is also the most volatile, therefore it is budgeted conservatively. Sales tax collections through the period are trending in line with budget, and over the prior year's collections.

Sales Tax - Overview

Through the period, the City has collected \$2,185,914 in sales tax payments. The City has entered into agreements with several Municipal Utility Districts (MUDs) for limited purpose annexation. Through these limited purpose annexations, the City and the MUDs share the sales tax collected within the jurisdictions. In addition to limited purpose annexation, the City has adopted economic development sales tax. Through the Richmond Development Corporation (RDC), the City transfers 25% of the total sales tax collected for the purpose of economic development. After distributing sales tax to participating entities, the City has retained \$1,513,351 in General Fund Sales Tax through the period. The table below shows the distribution of the net sales tax payment received from the Comptroller.

Sales Tax – General Fund Performance

The table below highlights the City's sales tax performance compared to budget and year-over-year (YoY). Through the period, the City is 21.50% higher than the prior year and is 15.25% over budget. It's important to note that the budget is based on a normal probability distribution of funds throughout the year. Changes within that distribution, as a result of prepayments, and audit adjustments may skew the budgeted amounts.

Property Taxes

Property taxes are the second largest and most stable revenue stream in the General Fund. Property tax collections through the period total \$1,143,286. Collections in FY21 are 37.6% of budget. Note that property tax is recorded both in the General Fund and the Debt Service fund. This portion of property tax reflects the General Fund collections only.

Utility Gross Receipts

Utility Gross Receipts consist of revenue generated from franchise agreements that the City maintains for the exclusive use of its right of ways for electric, phone, cable, and natural gas providers. Utility Gross Receipts through the period are \$184,154 or 21.3% of budget. Collections through the period in FY20 were \$203,369.

Other Operating Revenues

Other Operating Revenues are derived from a variety of revenue streams and are necessary to support operating expenditures. License and Permit Fees are \$183,187 through the period, or 27.5% of budget. Collections through the period in FY20 were \$164,632.



Court Fines are \$32,314 for the period, or 8.7% of budget. Collections through the period in FY20 were \$81,812.

Summary of Expenditures

Operating expenditures are those expenditures that are the direct result of providing City services and include a variety of costs. A few examples of the types of expenditures included in this category include salaries & benefits, supplies, purchased services, repairs and maintenance, and capital.

Expenditures in the General Fund for the year total \$3,913,019, or 21.5% of budget.

Utility Fund Summary

The Utility Fund is an Enterprise Fund type. It accounts for all the activity associated with delivering safe, high quality water to all customers. Enterprise Fund types are different than governmental funds, because enterprise funds act more like a business. The services that enterprise funds provide are typically supported by charges for service and other fees. The Utility fund is self-supporting, and it is not supported by property taxes.

Summary of Revenues

Water revenues have a direct correlation with the weather. As rainfall increases, the total usage decreases. In order to manage the volatility associated with precipitation and temperature, the City budgets based on an average expected year.

In the Utility Fund, Water and Sewer collection revenues through the period are \$1,656,394, or 18.9% of budget.

Summary of Expenditures

Utility Fund expenditures are incurred as the direct result of providing water production, distribution, and collection and treatment services and include a variety of costs. Expenditures in the Utility Fund for the year are \$1,809,648, or 20.1% of budget.

Activity Report for Utilities




Executive Summary

Sales tax is one of the most important revenue streams for the City, but it's also highly volatile and subject to risk. This analysis is intended to highlight the City's sales tax collections in comparison to its expected performance, which is the amount of revenue received compared to the budget.


In Texas, the State Comptroller's Office receives sales tax two months before it is remitted to the City, as a result there is a two-month timing difference between the State collection of revenue and the revenue sent to the City. This report covers sales tax payments received by the City from the Texas Comptroller's Office in the month of **December**, which reflects sales tax collections for the month of **October**.

The total sales tax rate within Richmond is 8.25%, of that total, 6.25% is collected and retained by the Texas Comptroller's office, and the remaining 2% is remitted to the City. Consistent with the comprehensive master plan, the City has entered into several strategic partnership agreements (SPAs) that allow for limited purpose annexation and the collection of sales tax within certain municipal utility districts (MUDs). While the City receives 100% of the sales tax collected within the City, these strategic partnership agreements provide for, in most cases, some sharing of the sales tax revenue (between the City and MUDs). As a result of these agreements, after the City remits the MUDs proportional share of its sales tax, the City then remits 25% of the remaining sales tax to the Development Corporation and retains 75% in the General Fund.



City Current Month at a Glance

The graphs below indicate that City sales tax collections are \$572,403 in December, compared to the budget allocation of \$443,077. The total collections are over budget by \$129,326, which is 29.19% higher than expected. This month a one-time negative audit adjustment in the amount \$26,940 was received.





City Year-to-Date at a Glance

The graphs below indicate that total sales tax collections are \$1,513,351 for the fiscal year, compared to the budgeted sales tax of \$1,313,089. December is the third month in the 2021 fiscal year, therefore collections will continue to increase with the passing of each subsequent month.

The City will accumulate and monitor any excess sales tax revenue and will recognize any actual gains at the end of the year once all revenues have been received. This approach helps minimize the month to month volatility of collections.






City Historical Performance





■ Budget Amount■ City Retained






Monthly Payment Allocation by Sector

Monthly Analysis Compared to Prior Year

The Retail Trade and Food & Entertainment Sectors are the primary industry sectors for the City and combined make up approximately 55% of the total collections. The sectors described in this analysis below make-up approximately 90% of the total collections for the City.

Retail: The Retail sector increased by 16.94% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The increase is the result of timing and better performance year-over-year in the Clothing and Non-store subsectors.

Food & Entertainment: The Food & Entertainment sector decreased by 6.03% when compared to the same period in the prior year. All subsectors were tracking slightly under the previous year's collections.

Information: The Information sector increased by 29.67% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The increase is primarily in the Telecommunications subsector where there has been continued volatility throughout the year as a result of timing.

Natural Resources: The Natural Resources sector decreased by 41.85% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The decrease in this sector is the result of an industry closely tied to Construction. Collections in this sector should be treated as one-time collections due to the volatility of the subsectors' collections.

Professional Services: The Professional Services sector decreased by -45.52% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The decrease in collections is related to services businesses in the online services space.

Utilities: The Utility sector decreased by 1.70% when compared to the same period in the prior year.

Wholesale Trade: The Wholesale Trade sector increased 1146.47% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The increase in this sector is tied to the Electronics subsector from a business dealing in warehouse equipment. Staff continues to monitor this sector, as there appears to be one-time payments, which may be subject to later adjustment by the Comptroller.

Waste & Remediation: The Waste & Remediation sector decreased by 17.58% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The decrease in collections occurred primarily in the Waste Management subsector.

Manufacturing: The Manufacturing sector decreased by 99.25% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The decrease in collections occurred primarily in the Mineral subsectors from a one-time negative audit adjustment.

* The collections by sector information is directly from the Confidentiality Report received from the Texas Comptroller's Office. The numbers reflected in the Confidentiality Report are unadjusted and will not match the Net Collections that the Comptroller publishes. The Net Collections published publicly include all tax payers, whereas the Confidentiality Report only includes tax payers that annually remit more than \$5,000, and does not include the other adjustments made to the Net Allocation. In order to remain confidential only the aggregate data by sector, and subsector can be reported.



THE INFORMATION PROVIDED TO THE CITY IS CONFIDENTIAL. It is not open to public inspection. A city may use the information only for the purpose of economic forecasting (Tex. Tax Code 321.3022(c)). Unauthorized distribution of confidential information is punishable by 6 months in jail and a \$1,000 fine (Tex. Govt Code sec. 552.352). As a result staff cannot answer specific questions about companies included within the aggregate sales tax number in this report.

Monthly Sales Tax Volatility








Sales Tax Background

Sales tax is an important but volatile revenue stream for the City, and it is closely monitored and analyzed.


Understanding how the City develops the sales tax forecast is an important part of this publication. This year the sales tax forecast utilized a conservative approach of an approximate 3% increase from the previous budget to maintain modest fiscal expectations.

Once developed, the sales tax budget is distributed across the months based on the percentage of collections that month would historically receive. It's important to understand that there are factors that can cause peaks and valleys in this distribution. These peaks and valleys are a result of the timing of the collection (i.e. when the business makes payment), the receipt of one-time collections, and audit adjustments, which can increase or decrease the actual collection. It is this volatility of the collections that make the comparison on a monthly basis a challenge. While sustained high or low monthly collections may signal a change in the trend, the individual monthly comparison will not provide a complete picture, thus greater attention should be paid to the year-to-date collections and budget.





A6. Review and discuss a policy related to reciting the Pledge of Allegiance to the United States flag and the Texas flag.



CITY OF RICHMOND

Policy—Pledges of Allegiance to the U.S. and Texas Flags

The City Commission adopts this policy and procedure for reciting the Pledges of Allegiance to the U.S. flag and the Texas flag during meetings of the City Commission and other Commissions, Boards, and Committees.

The Pledges may be led by individuals or by members of youth groups, social groups, veteran groups. The City Secretary shall post an invitation on the City's website asking members of the community to volunteer to lead the Pledges at City meetings. From the responses, the City Secretary shall prepare a list of such volunteers and the meeting date the person or groups has requested to lead the Pledges. If no person or group volunteers, the Chairperson may request that a Commissioner or member of the commission, board, or committee; a staff member; or a member of the public lead the Pledges.

The Chairperson shall announce the agenda item for the Pledges of Allegiance to the U.S. flag and the Texas flag.

The Chairperson shall request all persons participating to stand, as they are able, and face the flag.

The Chairperson shall introduce the person(s) to lead the assembly in the Pledges.

If applicable, the person(s) leading the Pledges may present the colors.

All persons participating in reciting the Pledges should, during the presentation of the colors, Pledge, and retirement of the colors: stand at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart; if not in uniform men should remove any non-religious headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart; if in uniform should remain silent, face the flag, and render the military salute; or members of the Armed Forces not in uniform and veterans may render the military salute in the manner provided for persons in uniform.

The person(s) leading the assembly in reciting the Pledge to the U.S. flag shall recite the Pledge as provided in 4 US Code Sec. 4: "I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

At the conclusion of the Pledge to the U.S. flag, the person(s) shall lead the assembly in reciting the Pledge to the Texas flag as provided in Texas Government Code, Section

3100.101: "Honor the Texas flag; I pledge allegiance to thee, Texas, one state under God, one and indivisible."

At the conclusion of the Pledges, the participants should stand while the colors are retired, if applicable.

At the conclusion of the Pledges or after the colors are retired, the assembly may be seated and the meeting will continue with the next agenda item.

The Pledge of Allegiance

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America

And to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation

Under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

Pledge to the Texas Flag

Honor the Texas flag; I pledge allegiance to thee, Texas, one state under God, one and indivisible.

POLICY REGARDING OPENING INVOCATIONS BEFORE MEETINGS OF THE CITY COMMISSION

The City Commission of Richmond, Texas ("the Commission") is the elected legislative and deliberative public body of the City of Richmond, Texas and serving the citizens of Richmond, Texas.

The Commission recognizes the long-maintained tradition of solemnizing legislative and deliberative proceedings by allowing for an invocation before each meeting, for the benefit and blessing of the Commission.

The Commission wishes to participate in the tradition of solemnizing its proceedings by allowing for an invocation before each meeting, for the benefit and blessing of the Commission, its deliberations and proceedings.

The Commission now desires to adopt this formal, written policy to clarify and codify its invocation practices; and

Our country's Founders recognized that we possess certain rights that cannot be awarded, surrendered, nor corrupted by human power, and the Founders explicitly attributed the origin of these, our inalienable rights, to a Creator. These rights ultimately ensure the self-government manifest in our Legislature, upon which we desire to invoke divine guidance and blessing.

Such prayer before deliberative public bodies has been consistently upheld as constitutional by American courts, including the United States Supreme Court.

In *Marsh v. Chambers*, 463 U.S. 783 (1983), the United States Supreme Court rejected a challenge to the Nebraska Legislature's practice of opening each day of its sessions with a prayer by a chaplain paid with taxpayer dollars, and specifically concluded, "The opening of sessions of legislative and other deliberative public bodies with prayer is deeply embedded in the history and tradition of this country. From colonial times through the founding of the Republic and ever since, the practice of legislative prayer has coexisted with the principles of disestablishment and religious freedom." *Id.*, at 786.

The Commission desires to avail itself of the Supreme Court's recognition that it is constitutionally permissible for a public body to "invoke divine guidance" on its work. *Id.*, at 792. Such invocation "is not, in these circumstances, an 'establishment' of religion or a step toward establishment; it is simply a tolerable acknowledgment of beliefs widely held among the people of this country." *Id.*

The Supreme Court affirmed in *Lynch v. Donnelly*, 465 U.S. 668 (1984), "Our history is replete with official references to the value and invocation of Divine guidance in deliberations and pronouncements of the Founding Fathers and contemporary leaders." *Id.*, at 675.

The Supreme Court further stated, that "government acknowledgments of religion serve, in the only ways reasonably possible in our culture, the legitimate secular purposes of solemnizing public occasions, expressing confidence in the future, and encouraging the recognition of what is worthy of appreciation in society. For that reason, and because of their history and ubiquity, those practices are not understood as conveying government approval of particular religious beliefs." *Id.*, at 693 (O'Connor, J., concurring).

The Supreme Court also famously observed in *Zorach v. Clauson*, 343 U.S. 306, (1952), "We are a religious people whose institutions presuppose a Supreme Being." *Id.*, at 313-14.

The Supreme Court acknowledged in *Holy Trinity Church v. United States*, 143 U.S. 457 (1892), that the American people have long followed a "custom of opening sessions of all deliberative bodies and most conventions with prayer...," *Id.*, at 471.

The Supreme Court has determined, "The content of [such] prayer is not of concern to judges where ... there is no indication that the prayer opportunity has been exploited to proselytize or advance any one, or to disparage any other, faith or belief." *Marsh*, 463 U.S. at 794-795.

The Supreme Court also proclaimed that it should not be the job of the courts or deliberative public bodies "to embark on a sensitive evaluation or to parse the content of a particular prayer" offered before a deliberative public body. *Id*.

The Supreme Court has counseled against the efforts of government officials to affirmatively screen, censor, prescribe and/or proscribe the specific content of public prayers offered by private speakers, as such government efforts would violate the First Amendment rights of those speakers. *See*, *e.g.*, *Lee v. Weisman*, 505 U.S. 577, 588-589 (1992).

In Simpson v. Chesterfield County Bd. of Supervisors, 404 F.3d 276 (4th Cir. 2004), cert. denied, the United States Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit reviewed and specifically approved as constitutional the prayer policy of a county board, and made a number of key findings about said policy.

The Commission is not bound by decisions of the Fourth Circuit, but hereby acknowledges the general guidance provided by the most important of that court's findings in *Simpson*, including the facts that the policy there:

- (1) Allowed for invocations for the benefit of the legislative body itself "rather than for the individual leading the invocation or for those who might also be present," *Id.*, at 284; and
- (2) Established a practice of compiling a list of local monotheistic congregations, "with addresses taken primarily from the phone book," whereto the county clerk would send an invitation each December addressed to the "religious leader" of each congregation, *Id.*, at 279; and
 - (3) Required the county clerk to schedule respondents to the invitation "to give

the invocation on a first-come, first-serve basis," *Id.*; and

(4) Thus, "made plain that [the county board] was not affiliated with any one specific faith by opening its doors to a wide pool of clergy." *Id.*, at 286.

The Fourth Circuit showed little concern that the prayers before board meetings in *Simpson* were "traditionally made to a divinity that is consistent with the Judeo-Christian tradition," *Id.*, at 280, because *Marsh* also considered, and found constitutionally acceptable, the fact that the prayers in question fit broadly within 'the Judeo-Christian tradition." *Id.*, at 283 (quoting *Marsh*, 463 U.S. at 793).

In *Pelphrey v. Cobb County*, 547 F.3d 1263, 1278 (11th Cir. 2008), the United States Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit followed the rationale and reasoning of *Marsh* and *Simpson* and upheld the constitutionality of a county commission's invocation policy.

The Eleventh Circuit in *Pelphrey* specifically rejected the argument that the Establishment Clause permits only nonsectarian prayers at legislative meetings, holding instead that prayers are permitted as long as "there is no indication the that prayer opportunity has been exploited to proselytize or advance any one, or to disparage any other, faith or belief," *Id.*, at 1266.

The Third Circuit in *Fields v Speaker of Pennsylvania House of Representatives*, 936 F3d 142 (3rd Cir. 2019) supports restricting prayers to clergy of theistic religions, *Id.*, at 155; and prohibits requiring participation, *Id.*, at 161.

The Commission intends to adopt a policy that does not proselytize or advance any faith or show any purposeful preference of one religious view to the exclusion of others.

The Commission recognizes its constitutional duty to interpret, construe, and amend its policies and ordinances to comply with constitutional requirements as they are announced.

The Commission accepts as binding the applicability of general principles of law and all the rights and obligations afforded under the United States and Texas Constitutions and statutes.

In order to solemnize proceedings of the City Commission of Richmond, Texas, it is the policy of the Commission to allow for, but not to mandate, an invocation or prayer to be offered before its meetings for the benefit of the Commission.

- 1. The prayer shall not be listed or recognized as an agenda item for the meeting or as part of the public business.
- 2. No member of the Commission, employee of the City, or any other person in attendance at the meeting shall be required to participate in any prayer that is offered.
- 3. The prayer shall be voluntarily delivered by an eligible member of the clergy in Richmond. To ensure that such person (the "invocation speaker") is selected from among a wide pool of clergy in the Richmond community, on a rotating basis, the invocation speaker shall be selected according to the following procedure:

- a. The City Secretary shall compile and maintain a database (the "Congregations List") of the religious congregations with an established presence in the local community of the City of Richmond, Texas.
- b. The Congregations List shall be compiled by referencing the listing for "churches," "congregations," "mosques," "temples," or other religious assemblies from research from the Internet and consultation with the local chambers of commerce. All religious congregations with an established presence in the local community of the City of Richmond, Texas are eligible to be included in the Congregations List, and any such congregation can confirm its inclusion by specific written request to the City Secretary.
- c. The Congregations List shall also include the name and contact information of any chaplain who may serve one or more of the Richmond Fire Department or Police Department.
- d. The Congregations List shall be updated, by reasonable efforts of the City Secretary, in November of each calendar year.
- e. Within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this policy, and on or about December 1 of each calendar year thereafter, the City Secretary shall mail an invitation addressed to the "religious leader" of each congregation listed on the Congregations List, as well as to the individual chaplains included on the Congregations List.
- f. The invitation shall be dated at the top of the page, signed by the City Secretary at the bottom of the page, and read as follows:

Dear religious leader,

The City Commission of Richmond, Texas makes it a policy to invite members of the clergy in Richmond to voluntarily offer a prayer before the beginning of its meetings, for the benefit and blessing of the Commission. As the leader of one of the religious congregations with an established presence in the local community, or in your capacity as a chaplain for one of the Richmond Fire Department or Police Department, you are eligible to offer this important service at an upcoming meeting of the Commission.

If you are willing to assist the Commission in this regard, please send a written reply at your earliest convenience to the City Secretary at the address included on this letterhead. Clergy are scheduled in the order the responses are received. The dates of the Commission's scheduled meetings for the upcoming year are listed on the following, attached page. If you have a preference among the dates, please state that request in your written reply.

This opportunity is voluntary, and you are free to offer the invocation according to the dictates of your own conscience. To maintain a spirit of respect and ecumenism, the Commission requests only that the prayer opportunity not be exploited as an effort to convert others to the particular faith of the invocation speaker, nor to disparage any faith or belief different than that of the invocation speaker.

On behalf of the City Commission of Richmond, Texas, I thank you in advance for considering this invitation.

- g. As the invitation letter indicates, the persons responding to the invitation shall be scheduled to deliver the prayers in the order the person's response is received.
- 4. If no eligible member of the clergy is available to provide the invocation, a member of the Commission may deliver the invocation. The designated Commission member shall deliver the prayer or invocation in his or her capacity as a private citizen, and according to the dictates of his or her own conscience.
- 5. No guidelines or limitations shall be issued regarding an invocation's content, except that the Commission shall request by the language of this policy that no prayer should proselytize or advance any faith or disparage the religious faith or non-religious views of others.
- 6. No invocation speaker shall receive compensation for his or her service.
- 7. The City Secretary shall make every reasonable effort to ensure that a variety of eligible invocation speakers are scheduled for the Commission meetings. In any event, no invocation speaker shall be scheduled to offer a prayer at consecutive meetings of the Commission or at more than three (3) Commission meetings in any calendar year.
- 8. Neither the Commission nor the City Secretary shall engage in any prior inquiry, review of, or involvement in, the content of any prayer to be offered by an invocation speaker.
- 9. Shortly before the opening gavel that officially begins the meeting and the agenda/business of the public, the Mayor, chairperson, or presiding officer of the Commission meeting shall introduce the invocation speaker and invite only those who wish to do so to stand for those observances of and for the Commission.
- 10. This policy is not intended, and shall not be implemented or construed in any way, to affiliate the Commission with, nor express the Commission's preference for, any faith

or religious denomination. Rather, this policy is intended to acknowledge and express the Commission's respect for the diversity of religious denominations and faiths represented and practiced among the citizens of Richmond, Texas.

This policy shall become effective upon adoption by the City Commission.

December 2018 Legal Q&A

Q. Is an invocation allowed at a city council meeting?

A. Many Texas cities, as well as other governmental entities, open their meetings with a brief prayer. Is this a violation of the doctrine of the separation of church and state? Not usually. Below is a summary of the law relating to prayer at a governmental body's meetings. Of course, each city should consult with local legal counsel regarding whether to open meetings with a prayer.

Q. What is "legislative prayer" and how is it analyzed under the law?

A. A prayer used to open the session of a governmental body is known as "legislative prayer." Legislative prayer is treated as a special issue under the United States Constitution's "Establishment Clause." The Establishment Clause is the part of the First Amendment that reads: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof...." U.S. CONST., amend I. Usually, the United States Supreme Court (Court) uses a three-part test, known as the *Lemon* test, to determine whether a governmental action violates the Establishment Clause. *Lemon v. Kurtzman*, 403 U.S. 602 (1971). However, in the case of legislative prayer, the Court did not use the *Lemon* test but rather studied the role of legislative prayer in our country's history. In *Marsh v. Chambers*, the governing decision on the issue, the Court upheld the State of Nebraska's practice of opening each day during the legislative session with a prayer. *Marsh v. Chambers*, 463 U.S. 783 (1983).

Q. Why is legislative prayer different?

A. The Court based its reasoning in *Marsh* on the perceived intent of the writers of the Establishment Clause. *Marsh*, 463 U.S. at 790-92. According to the Court, the first Congress passed the First Amendment, including the Establishment Clause, in the same week that a chaplain was hired for the Congress. *Id.* at 790. In the eyes of the Court, this action indicated that legislative prayer was excepted from the Establishment Clause. *Id.* The Court held that legislative prayer created no more government entanglement with religion than: (1) bus transportation to parochial schools (citing *Everson v. Board of Education*, 330 U.S. 1 (1946)); (2) beneficial grants for higher education (citing *Tilton v. Richardson*, 403 U.S. 672 (1971)); or (3) tax exemptions for religious organizations (citing *Walz v. Tax Comm'n*, 397 U.S. 664 (1970)). *Marsh*, 463 U.S. at 791. The Court noted that the content of the prayer itself should be of no concern to judges unless it is proselytizing or is disparaging to other faiths. *Id.* at 794-95.

Q. How is legislative prayer different from school prayer?

A. If legislative prayer is acceptable, why is prayer at school graduations or assemblies often successfully challenged? First, those involved in city council meetings are usually adults. Therefore, courts consider them to be less impressionable and susceptible to religious

indoctrination than children. Marsh, 463 U.S. at 795. Second, schools expect children to attend and participate in all aspects of school graduations or assemblies, and stepping out discreetly is difficult, if not impossible. Lee v. Weisman, 505 U.S. 577, 597 (1992). In contrast, adults attending a city council meeting may step out quietly for any reason without calling too much attention to themselves, thus choosing not to participate. Id.

Q. Can a city be sure that its legislative prayer is appropriate?

A: Previously, it was difficult for cities to determine whether their legislative prayer practices were appropriate. However, after the Court's decision in *Town of Greece v. Galloway*, cities have some clarification that may aid them in gauging whether their legislative prayer practices are appropriate. *Town of Greece v. Galloway*, 572 U.S. 565, 134 S.Ct. 1811 (2014). That being said, it may still be impossible for a city to be **completely** certain, and a city should defer to local legal counsel in adopting a legislative prayer policy.

Q: What changed in the aftermath of Town of Greece v. Galloway?

A: In 2014, the United States Supreme Court addressed the question of whether prayers preceding town council meetings violated the First Amendment's Establishment Clause. At the time the Court took up the *Town of Greece* case, a conflict existed among the circuits regarding the scope of the *Marsh* holding and whether and to what extent sectarian prayers before council meetings were constitutionally permissible. In a 5-4 vote, the Court held that the sectarian prayers do not violate the United States Constitution, and are perfectly permissible. *Town of Greece*, 134 S.Ct. at 1828.

Q. What guidance did Town of Greece v. Galloway offer regarding legislative prayer?

A: The *Town of Greece* opinion contained guidance regarding when a prayer is and is not constitutional. As a rule, legislative prayer should be assumed constitutional so long as it:

- Is given at the session opening to lend gravity to the occasion;
- Reflects the values of the nation;
- Is given in a solemn and respectful tone;
- Invites lawmakers to reflect on shared ideals and common ends; and
- Is non-discriminatory among faiths.

On the other hand, legislative prayer will most likely not be constitutionally permissible if there is a pattern of:

- Denigrating/disparaging any religion;
- Threatening damnation;
- Preaching conversion; or
- Proselytizing or advancing any faith or belief. Id. at 1823-24.

Inquiries about the constitutionality of a prayer should be looked at in terms of the prayer opportunity as a whole, and should not focus on the content of a single prayer. The exact point at which a prayer becomes unconstitutional is uncertain. For instance, the Court did not establish a

bright line rule as to how extensive the denigration or proselytization has to be for a prayer situation to be unconstitutional.

Q: What should a city council avoid if it engages in legislative prayer practices?

A: A city council should avoid:

- Directing the public to participate;
- Singling out dissidents for criticism;
- Indicating that decisions might be influenced by acquiescence in the prayer opportunity;
- Classifying citizens based on religious views;
- Chastising dissenters;
- Attempting "lengthy disquisition on religious dogma;"
- Refusing a request to offer a prayer; and
- Scheduling prayer in temporal proximity to administrative or quasi-judicial activities. *Id.* at 1826-27, 1829.

Q. Should a city make an instruction booklet for religious leaders?

A. No. When a governmental entity tells religious leaders how to pray, even if the intention is to be helpful, that action violates the Establishment Clause. The Supreme Court held that a booklet given to religious leaders outlining what was and was not appropriate for a prayer at a school graduation was effectively a composition of the prayer by the government. Lee v. Weisman, 505 U.S. 577, 588 (1992). In the words of the Court, "it is no part of the business of government to compose official prayers of any group of the American people to recite as part of a religious program carried on by government." Id. (quoting Engel v. Vitale, 370 U.S. 421, 425 (1962)).

Q: What can a city do to update its "prayer policy" if it does engage in legislative prayer practices?

A: A city council that engages in legislative prayer should consider adopting a policy setting out their prayer practices. Policies might include the following information:

- A statement setting out the purpose of the prayer (examples of purposes are, "to lend gravity to public proceedings," to "acknowledge the place religion holds in the lives of many private citizens," and "to invite lawmakers to reflect upon shared ideals and common ends before they embark on the business of governing");
- An explanation of the types of prayers that are allowed, and a statement that those offering prayers shall not proselytize or disparage any other faith or belief;
- A statement that no one is required to participate and that members of the public are free to join the meeting after the prayer or leave the meeting during the prayer;
- A statement that members of the public will not be treated differently based on whether they participate in the prayer; and
- A description of the process used to select who gives an invocation and how to become an invocation giver. ALLISON E. BURNS, LEGISLATIVE PRAYER POLICIES IN THE WAKE OF TOWN OF GREECE V. GALLOWAY (2014), available at: https://texascityattorneys.org/2014summer-conference-speaker-materials/.

The Supreme Court stated that, "So long as the town maintains a policy of nondiscrimination, the Constitution does not require it to search beyond its borders for non-Christian prayer givers in an effort to achieve religious balancing." This means that a city council does not have to actively seek out potential prayer-givers. *Town of Greece*, 134 S.Ct. at 1814.

Q: What if atheists or other small religious denominations want to offer an invocation?

A: Cities must be prepared to consider requests from any group that may want to give an invocation, including small religious denominations, agnostic organizations, and atheist groups.

Q: Can city council members offer prayers at city council meetings?

A: This is still unclear. The Supreme Court chose not to address that particular question in the legal precedent described above. Thus, a city council that wishes to have a member offer or lead the prayer should consult with local legal counsel prior to doing so.

Background / Review Notes


- The proposed replat will combines two lots, Lot 19 and Lot 20 of Estates at Lakes of Williams Ranch Section 1 into one (1) lot.





A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS, APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING AMENDMENT NUMBER 5 TO THE WATER SUPPLY AND WASTEWATER SERVICES CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS AND FORT BEND COUNTY MUNICIPAL UTILITY DISTRICT NO. 140

The City of Richmond, Texas ("City") and Fort Bend County Municipal Utility District No. 140 ("District") entered into an Amended and Restated Water Supply and Wastewater Services Contract dated July 1, 2004 ("Contract").

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality sent a notice of violation to the District dated October 8, 2020 (the "Notice of Violation"), alleging, among other things, that the Contract does not authorize the purchase of enough water to meet the monthly or annual needs of the District.

The City and the District have determined that the alleged violation refers to the maximum rate at which water must be supplied by the City to the District to meet customer demand during peak usage.

The City and the District desire to amend the Contract to address the issue raised by the Notice of Violation, Now, Therefore,

AMENDMENT NO. 5 TO THE WATER SUPPLY AND WASTEWATER SERVICES CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS AND FORT BEND COUNTY MUNICIPAL UTILITY DISTRICT NO. 140

This AMENDMENT NO. 5 ("Amendment") to the AMENDED AND RESTATED WATER SUPPLY AND WASTEWATER SERVICES CONTRACT dated July 1, 2004 ("Contract") is entered into between THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS ("City") and FORT BEND COUNTY MUNICIPAL UTILITY DISTRICT NO. 140 ("District") effective the 1st day of January 2021.

Background

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality sent a notice of violation to the District dated October 8, 2020 (the "Notice of Violation"), alleging, among other things, that the Contract does not authorize the purchase of enough water to meet the monthly or annual needs of the District.

The City and the District have determined that the alleged violation refers to the maximum rate at which water must be supplied by the City to the District to meet customer demand during peak usage.

The District and the City now desire to amend the Contract to address the issue raised by the Notice of Violation.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, obligations, and benefits contained herein, the City and the District, agree as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 3.3 of the Contract shall be amended to read as follows:

3.3. **Maximum Number of Gallons.** The City agrees to provide up to four hundred fifty thousand four hundred and fifty (450,450) Gpd of Water to the District. The maximum authorized purchase rate per connection shall be equal to 0.49 gallons per minute and such figure shall automatically be adjusted to be consistent with the City's then-current system requirements pursuant to Texas Administrative Code §290.45(f)(4), including any Alternative Capacity Requirements approved by the Commission.

SECTION 2. The following typographical errors are hereby corrected in Amendment No. 1 to the Contract dated September 19, 2005, ("Amendment No. 1") and Amendment No. 3 to the Contract dated July 16, 2007 ("Amendment No. 3"):

SYNOPSIS

Last year, the City hired AutoArch Architects to complete facility assessments of the Old Fire Station 1 on Jackson at Second Street and the strip office building at 1116 Myrtle. Due to the total cost and undetermined ultimate use of the facilities, the City decided to address the exterior aesthetics of both location's as a first phase of rehabilitation.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2019 GOALS ADDRESSED

Rehabilitate and preserve Richmond's existing neighborhoods and community assets.

BACKGROUND

Both facilities have had most of the interiors cleared and asbestos abatements completed for future build out. Plans for the exterior rehabilitation have been reviewed and approved by the City's Historical Commission. On November 19, 2020, ten (10) bids were received for the proposed rehabilitation projects. The low qualified bidder for each property was Premier Worldwide, Inc. with a combined bid of \$309,264.

The scope of work for Myrtle street location includes:

- Painting of exterior brick.
- Replacement of existing metal wall panel at rear exterior walls and parapet.
- Replacement of existing metal roof.
- Replacement of metal gutters and downspouts.
- Painting of existing metal panel fascia and soffits building front and sides.

The scope of work for the Old Fire Station includes:

- Painting of existing brick.
- Painting of exterior doors not removed.

- Provide new prefinished aluminum standing seam metal roof with ice and water shield over existing plywood substrate.
- Replacing the wood fascia and soffit around the building with a cementitious fascia and soffit board.
- Replacing exterior metal panel.
- Replacing aluminum storefront entry doors and window.
- Replacing aluminum storefront windows.
- Replacing half glass hollow metal doors with new flush hollow metal doors in existing steel frames.
- Replacing sectional doors with glass aluminum sectional doors.

The estimated construction time is 90 days from notice to proceed.

After reviewing the bids and checking references; the project architect, AutoArch Architects, is recommending approval of the base bid.



The Brazos River Authority (BRA) and the City of Richmond (Richmond) entered into the System Water Availability Agreement with effective date of September 1, 2019, whereby BRA agreed to make available and Richmond agreed to purchase 2,773 acre-feet of raw water per fiscal year.

Richmond has requested to temporarily resell 2,773 acre-feet of water under the Agreement to The Dow Chemical Company, the Resale Purchaser.

BRA has agreed to consent to such resale of water.

The City Commission of the City of Richmond deems it in the public interest to authorize a temporary resale of 2,773 acre-feet of water to The Dow Chemical Company under the System Water Availability Agreement with BRA; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS:

<u>Section 1.</u> The facts and recitations set forth in the preamble of this Resolution are hereby found to be true and correct.

<u>Section 2.</u> The City Commission of the City of Richmond authorizes a temporary resale of 2,773 acre-feet of water to The Dow Chemical Company under the System Water Availability Agreement with the Brazos River Authority as attached in Exhibit "A."

<u>Section 3.</u> The assignment will in no way relieve the City of Richmond from any of its obligations under the System Water Availability Agreements.

<u>Section 4.</u> Effective Date. This Resolution shall be effective from and after its adoption.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, BRA and Purchaser entered into a System Water Availability Agreement ("Agreement") with an effective date of September 1, 2019, whereby BRA agreed to make available and Purchaser agreed to purchase 2,773 acre-feet of raw water per Fiscal Year for municipal purposes; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 33 of the Agreement, Purchaser has requested to temporarily resell 2,773 acre-feet of raw water made available under the Agreement to Resale Purchaser; and

WHEREAS, to facilitate this resale, Purchaser requires the addition of temporary diversion points from which Resale Purchaser may access water made available under the Agreement and the authorization to use the water for industrial purposes.

NOW, **THEREFORE**, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the Parties agree to temporarily amend the Agreement as follows:

AMENDMENTS

- 1. The BRA hereby consents to the temporary resale of 2,773 acre-feet of water under the Agreement to the Resale Purchaser. Unless terminated earlier consistent with the terms of this Amendment, this consent shall be effective from the Effective Date to August 31, 2023 (the "Termination Date") with an option to extend an additional two year period from the Termination Date with 30 days' written notice provided to BRA by Purchaser. In the event Purchaser exercises the option for an additional two year period, the terms and conditions of this Amendment shall remain in effect until August 31, 2025.
- 2. Until the Termination Date, Resale Purchaser may divert raw water made available under the Agreement at the locations shown on Exhibit "A-1", attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.
- 3. Resale Purchaser may utilize the water for industrial purposes.
- 4. Until the Termination Date, any reference to Exhibit "A" in the Agreement shall also be deemed a reference to Exhibit "A-1".
- 5. Resale Purchaser hereby agrees to abide by all of the terms and conditions contained in the Agreement and accepts any and all liability for any failure to do so.

- 6. Resale Purchaser shall be responsible for all coordination with BRA and the Brazos Watermaster related to ordering and stopping releases, coordinating run-of-river diversions if applicable, as well as reporting, metering, and notification requirements under the Agreement, and notwithstanding the foregoing, Resale Purchaser agrees to comply with all BRA water reporting requirements, water conservation plans, drought contingency plans and TCEQ Brazos Watermaster requirements.
- 7. This Amendment shall in no way relieve Purchaser from any of its obligations, including payment, under the Agreement, and Purchaser shall be responsible for ensuring that Resale Purchaser complies with all the terms and conditions contained therein and accepts any and all liability for any failure to do so.
- BRA reserves the right to withdraw its consent of the resale at any time and for any cause without penalty or liability. Upon receipt of such written withdrawal of consent from BRA, Resale Purchaser shall immediately cease diverting BRA water made available under this Amendment.
- In the event the amount of water made available to Purchaser under the Agreement is reduced for any reason, Resale Purchaser agrees that such reduction shall also result in a reduced amount available under this Amendment.
- 10. The address for Resale Purchaser, for the purposes of Section 28 of the Agreement, shall be as follows:

- 11. Capitalized terms used but not defined herein shall have the respective meanings given to them in the Agreement.
- 12. This Amendment shall commence on the Effective Date and shall continue until the Termination Date. This Amendment shall no longer be of any force or effect after the Termination Date, and the terms and conditions of the Agreement shall be as they were prior to the execution of this Amendment, and Exhibit "A-1" shall be deleted in its entirety. Following the Termination Date, BRA and Purchaser shall be the only parties to the Agreement.

This Amendment shall be deemed a part of the Agreement and shall be binding on the parties. Except as amended herein, the terms and conditions of the Agreement remain in full force and effect.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR COUNTY-MANAGED ROAD CONSTRUCTION PROJECT FORT BEND COUNTY MOBILITY PROJECT NO. 13106 – FM 762/10th STREET

This Agreement is made and entered into pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Chapter 791 of the TEXAS GOVERNMENT CODE and Section 251.012 of the TEXAS TRANSPORTATION CODE, by and between the City of Richmond, a municipal corporation and home-rule city of the State of Texas, situated in Fort Bend County, acting by and through its City Commission, ("City"), and Fort Bend County, a body corporate and politic under the laws of the State of Texas, acting by and through its Commissioners Court, ("County").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the County is authorized to participate with other local governmental entities to fund certain regional street and road improvements and associated drainage facilities that are funded in part by the state or federal government; and

WHEREAS, the Project, hereinafter defined and contemplated in this Agreement is the construction of roadway improvements that will enhance the traffic flow/circulation and drainage in the service area, and such Project is desired by the City and the County; and

WHEREAS, the County may not expend proceeds of bond issues or taxes levied pursuant to Article III, Section 52 (b) or (c) of the Texas Constitution on city streets that are not integral parts of or connecting links with county roads or state highways in accordance with Section 251.012 of the TEXAS TRANSPORTATION CODE; and

WHEREAS, the parties assert that the Project is part of a city street that is an integral part of or a connecting link with county roads or state highways in accordance with Section 251.012 of the TEXAS TRANSPORTATION CODE; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Fort Bend County finds that the Project contemplated in this Agreement serves a County purpose; and

WHEREAS, the County is in the process of acquiring property for the creation of and expansion of the County Emergency Operations Center campus and has requested that the City abandon the Third Street right-of-way between Fort Street and Austin Street; and

WHEREAS, the City and the County agree to participate in this Project according to the terms of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the governing bodies of the City and County have authorized this Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants, agreements and benefits to both parties, it is agreed as follows:

<u>AGREEMENT</u>

Section 1. Purpose

The purpose of this Agreement is to outline the funding obligations related to the proposed improvements to FM 762/10th Street in the City of Richmond, Texas.

Section 2. <u>Definitions</u>

- A. *City* means the City of Richmond, Texas.
- B. *County* means Fort Bend County, Texas.
- C. **Project** means the improvements to FM 762/10th Street Extension from US 90A to Clay Street, as provided in the preliminary design with at-grade crossing of Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR), Mobility Bond Project #13106, CFA Project No. 1511-003-01, including right-of-way acquisition, outfall drainage improvements and utility relocations; to plan and construct a four-lane concrete roadway with curbs; expand the road right-of-way to 120 feet (or as otherwise determined jointly by City and County to be needed to meet the ultimate mobility needs for the Richmond area); to improve mobility in north Richmond as the first phase of a long-range project to provide an access bridge of the Brazos River; and improving roadway drainage with the construction of an underground storm drain system.
 - D. *Eligible Project Costs* means costs, as determined by County in its sole discretion, for construction of roadway improvements, project related drainage facilities, utility and pipeline conflicts, approved traffic control devices, and sidewalks up to five feet (5') wide consistent with current City Infrastructure Standards. Eligible Project Costs shall include costs for engineering design and services related to the completion of Plans, Specifications and Estimates ("PS&E"); the costs of County's right-of-way acquisition for the Project; and construction related services for such roadway improvements. Eligible Project Costs shall exclude design and construction costs related to landscaping; ornamental lighting; irrigation; hike and bike trails; and the oversizing of water, wastewater, and drainage utilities outside the project boundaries. Eligible Project Costs shall include resolution of utility conflicts created by the construction of Project elements and similar facilities proposed to be part of the Project.

Section 3. Incorporation of Recitals

The representations, covenants and recitations set forth in the foregoing recitals are material to this Agreement and are incorporated into this Agreement.

Section 4. County Rights and Obligations

- A. Design and Right of Way Acquisition
 - 1. The County is responsible for managing the design of the Project in accordance the applicable state and federal laws related to this Project.
 - The County will submit the plans for the Project to the City for review and comment to ensure the Project is designed in accordance with the current City design standards applicable to roadways, lighting, signage, and drainage, as identified by the City prior to County proceeding with design of the Project. The street name signs shall be installed in accordance with the City's standards and the Texas Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices.
 - 3. The County agrees to acquire the remaining right-of-way for the full 120 feet right-of-way width, other than Parcel 1 described on Exhibit A hereof, necessary for construction of the Project in the name of the Public for public purposes, specifically for use as a public street and right of way for public utilities.

B. Construction of the Project

- 1. The County shall bid and construct the Project in accordance with approved specifications and compliance with the applicable state and federal laws related to the Project. This responsibility shall include the management of the relocation of utilities, including gas, overhead power and telecommunications, and entering into a contract for engineering design and construction project phase services and inspections.
- 2. Prior to the award of the contract for construction of the Project by the County, the County will consider written comments provided by the City related to the low bidder for the Project. The contract to construct the Project shall also include:
 - a) The construction of the twelve-inch (12") and six-inch (6") water lines to replace existing 12" and 6" water lines, as required due to conflicts created by the construction of Project elements and similar facilities proposed to be part of the Project; and
 - b) The construction of an eight-inch (8") sewer line to replace the existing four-inch (4") sewer line, as required due to conflicts created by the construction of Project elements and similar facilities proposed to be part of the Project.
- C. The City acknowledges and accepts the fact that County is obligated to follow Chapter 262 of the Texas Local Government Code as it relates to the award of the contract.

- D. During the work on the Project, the County shall provide the City the opportunity to review all documents, maps, plats, records, photographs, reports and drawings affecting the construction and to inspect the work in progress. The County, with input from the City, shall oversee the construction and completion of the Project. Any deficiencies brought to the attention of County by the City shall be promptly addressed by the County. If the County Engineer determines that the deficiencies are actionable under the terms of the construction contract, the County will work with the construction contractor to correct any City identified deficiencies. Notwithstanding the foregoing, all final decisions related to the construction contract performance shall be at the County's sole discretion.
- E. The County shall submit reports to the City describing in sufficient detail the progress of the Project. These reports shall be submitted to City at increments agreed to between the parties as appropriate for the various phases of the Project. Reports received by the County from contractor and/or consultants detailing the progress of the Project shall suffice for the requirements of this section, so long as the County has reviewed such reports and confirmed accuracy of the contractor's report.
- F. County will coordinate with the Texas Department of Transportation to obtain the necessary approvals and permits for the intersection improvements and connection to FM 762 and US 90A.
- G. The County may elect to forego construction of the Project at any time. The County shall provide written notice to the City of its decision to forego construction and pay to the City all amounts previously paid by City related to the acquisition of Parcel 1 described on Exhibit A, cost and associated fees and other consideration required by UPRR for 10th Street to cross the UPRR rail corridor, any enhancements and improvements that are not Eligible Project Costs, and \$250,000 for the abandoned 3rd Street right of way between Fort Street and Austin Street upon sixty (60) days of said notice to the City.
- H. Upon completion of construction of the Project, but no later than ninety (90) calendar days after final payments to all vendors, the County will furnish the City with a full accounting of the funds expended on the Project and an electronic copy of the record drawings showing the Project. The City may review the County's records regarding this Project to confirm the accuracy of the full accounting.
- I. The County agrees and commits to the acquisition of at least fifty percent (50%) of the right of way for the Project within twenty-four (24) months of approval of the Agreement by the Commissioners Court. The Parties may agree to an extension of the twenty-four (24) month period if circumstances, unique to the acquisition of the right of way, prevent the acquisition of the above-stated percentage of right of way.

Section 5. City Rights and Obligations

A Prior to award the Project for construction by the County, the City shall pay the

County for all costs to be reimbursed by the City to the County, including additional funds due from the City for enhancements and improvements that are not Eligible Project Costs, required to satisfy the City's obligation under this Agreement.

- B. The City shall request and secure the rights for 10^{th} Street to cross the UPRR rail corridor. The County shall be responsible for any and all associated fees and other considerations required by UPRR, including the maintenance or re-establishment of the 10^{th} Street crossing as part of the City's wayside horn system on the UPRR rail line, up to an amount not to exceed one million dollars and no/100 (\$1,000,000.00). Any and all associated fees and costs for other considerations required by UPRR to secure the rights for 10^{th} to cross the rail corridor in excess of one million dollars and no/100 (\$1,000,000.00) shall be paid by the City.
- C. Within thirty (30) calendar days of the execution of this Agreement, the City shall provide the required construction details, design standards and technical specifications applicable to roadways and drainage in which the Project should be designed to meet. Prior to the County initiating final design of the Project, the City shall provide the County Engineer with written approval of the preliminary engineering report. Upon transmittal of the construction plans by the County, the City shall review and comment on the County's construction plans within two (2) weeks of receipt of by the City. All project design and construction comments shall be directed to the County Engineer or his designated representative for dissemination to the County's contractors, consultants and employees.
- D. During the work on the Project, City shall have the right to review all documents, maps, plats, records, photographs, reports and drawings affecting the construction and to inspect the work in progress. Any deficiencies shall be provided in writing to the County Engineer. The City agrees that the County is the contracted party and the City shall not provide any direction to the consultant or the contractor, except with concurrence of the County Engineer.
- E. The City has acquired the parcel necessary for construction of the Project identified as Parcel 1 ("City Acquisition Parcel") on Exhibit A. The City will make available for the Project, all right of way, easements and parcels acquired in the vicinity of and necessary for the Project owned, acquired and or controlled by the City at no cost to the County.
- F. The City shall fund any and all Project enhancements and all upgrades to the Project requested by the City and all items determined not to be Eligible Project Costs as defined in Section 1. Such Project enhancements and upgrades to Project enhancements shall include, but are not limited to, landscaping; ornamental lighting; irrigation; hike and bike trails; and the oversizing of water, sewer and drainage facilities, as determined by the County. The City shall provide written confirmation of the scope of enhancements and improvements determined not to be Eligible Project Costs as defined in this Agreement that are requested by the City to be included in the Project. The City's costs for such Project enhancements shall be the incremental costs exceeding the costs for such unenhanced facilities that are included in the Eligible Project Costs and for oversizing of water, sewer, and drainage facilities shall be the increase in costs relating to

such oversizing (such as the larger standard size pipe diameter, trench size, etc.).

Upon completion of the Project, each party shall maintain that portion of the Project within its own jurisdiction.

Section 8. Limit of Appropriation

Prior to the execution of this Agreement, the County has been advised by the City, and the County clearly understands and agrees, such understanding and agreement being of the absolute essence to this Agreement, that the City shall have available the total maximum amount of \$600,000 and contribute the required portion of Parcel 1 as its total contribution, pursuant to Section 5. E., and any amounts in excess of that amount for Project enhancements and improvements as determined in Section 5.F, specifically allocated to fully discharge any and all liabilities that may be incurred by the City for the Project. Except for the City's costs related to the City Acquisition Parcels in accordance with Section 5. E. and adjustments in cost due to improvements requested by the City in accordance with Section 5.F.; City shall not be obligated to pay any additional amount.
- B. The County does further understand and agree, said understanding and agreement also being of the absolute essence of this Agreement, that the total maximum funding that the County may become entitled to hereunder and the total maximum amount that the City will reimburse the County hereunder will not under any condition, circumstance or interpretation hereof exceed the amount contributed by the City to the Project in accordance with Sections 5.E and F.
 - C. Each party paying for the performance of its obligations under this Agreement shall make

those payments from current revenues available to that party.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the County is authorized to participate with other local governmental entities to fund certain regional street and road improvements and associated drainage facilities that are funded in part by the state or federal government; and

- C. **Project** means the improvements to FM 762/10th Street Extension from US 90A to Clay Street, as provided in the preliminary design with at-grade crossing of Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR), Mobility Bond Project #13106, CFA Project No. 1511-003-01, including right-of-way acquisition, outfall drainage improvements and utility relocations; to plan and construct a four-lane concrete roadway with curbs; expand the road right-of-way to 120 feet (or as otherwise determined jointly by City and County to be needed to meet the ultimate mobility needs for the Richmond area); to improve mobility in north Richmond as the first phase of a long-range project to provide an access bridge of the Brazos River; and improving roadway drainage with the construction of an underground storm drain system.
 - D. *Eligible Project Costs* means costs, as determined by County in its sole discretion, for construction of roadway improvements, project related drainage facilities, utility and pipeline conflicts, approved traffic control devices, and sidewalks up to five feet (5') wide consistent with current City Infrastructure Standards. Eligible Project Costs shall include costs for engineering design and services related to the completion of Plans, Specifications and Estimates ("PS&E"); the costs of County's right-of-way acquisition for the Project; and construction related services for such roadway improvements. Eligible Project Costs shall exclude design and construction costs related to landscaping; ornamental lighting; irrigation; hike and bike trails; and the oversizing of water, wastewater, and drainage utilities outside the project boundaries. Eligible Project Costs shall include resolution of utility conflicts created by the construction of Project elements and similar facilities proposed to be part of the Project.

Section 3. Incorporation of Recitals

The representations, covenants and recitations set forth in the foregoing recitals are material to this Agreement and are incorporated into this Agreement.

Section 4. County Rights and Obligations

- A. Design and Right of Way Acquisition
 - 1. The County is responsible for managing the design of the Project in accordance the applicable state and federal laws related to this Project.
 - The County will submit the plans for the Project to the City for review and comment to ensure the Project is designed in accordance with the current City design standards applicable to roadways, lighting, signage, and drainage, as identified by the City prior to County proceeding with design of the Project. The street name signs shall be installed in accordance with the City's standards and the Texas Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices.
 - 3. The County agrees to acquire the remaining right-of-way for the full 120 feet right-of-way width, other than Parcel 1 described on Exhibit A hereof, necessary for construction of the Project in the name of the Public for public purposes, specifically for use as a public street and right of way for public utilities.

B. Construction of the Project

- 1. The County shall bid and construct the Project in accordance with approved specifications and compliance with the applicable state and federal laws related to the Project. This responsibility shall include the management of the relocation of utilities, including gas, overhead power and telecommunications, and entering into a contract for engineering design and construction project phase services and inspections.
- 2. Prior to the award of the contract for construction of the Project by the County, the County will consider written comments provided by the City related to the low bidder for the Project. The contract to construct the Project shall also include:
 - a) The construction of the twelve-inch (12") and six-inch (6") water lines to replace existing 12" and 6" water lines, as required due to conflicts created by the construction of Project elements and similar facilities proposed to be part of the Project; and
 - b) The construction of an eight-inch (8") sewer line to replace the existing four-inch (4") sewer line, as required due to conflicts created by the construction of Project elements and similar facilities proposed to be part of the Project.
- C. The City acknowledges and accepts the fact that County is obligated to follow Chapter 262 of the Texas Local Government Code as it relates to the award of the contract.

- D. During the work on the Project, the County shall provide the City the opportunity to review all documents, maps, plats, records, photographs, reports and drawings affecting the construction and to inspect the work in progress. The County, with input from the City, shall oversee the construction and completion of the Project. Any deficiencies brought to the attention of County by the City shall be promptly addressed by the County. If the County Engineer determines that the deficiencies are actionable under the terms of the construction contract, the County will work with the construction contractor to correct any City identified deficiencies. Notwithstanding the foregoing, all final decisions related to the construction contract performance shall be at the County's sole discretion.
- E. The County shall submit reports to the City describing in sufficient detail the progress of the Project. These reports shall be submitted to City at increments agreed to between the parties as appropriate for the various phases of the Project. Reports received by the County from contractor and/or consultants detailing the progress of the Project shall suffice for the requirements of this section, so long as the County has reviewed such reports and confirmed accuracy of the contractor's report.
- F. County will coordinate with the Texas Department of Transportation to obtain the necessary approvals and permits for the intersection improvements and connection to FM 762 and US 90A.
- G. The County may elect to forego construction of the Project at any time. The County shall provide written notice to the City of its decision to forego construction and pay to the City all amounts previously paid by City related to the acquisition of Parcel 1 described on Exhibit A, cost and associated fees and other consideration required by UPRR for 10th Street to cross the UPRR rail corridor, any enhancements and improvements that are not Eligible Project Costs, and \$250,000 for the abandoned 3rd Street right of way between Fort Street and Austin Street upon sixty (60) days of said notice to the City.
- H. Upon completion of construction of the Project, but no later than ninety (90) calendar days after final payments to all vendors, the County will furnish the City with a full accounting of the funds expended on the Project and an electronic copy of the record drawings showing the Project. The City may review the County's records regarding this Project to confirm the accuracy of the full accounting.
- I. The County agrees and commits to the acquisition of at least fifty percent (50%) of the right of way for the Project within twenty-four (24) months of approval of the Agreement by the Commissioners Court. The Parties may agree to an extension of the twenty-four (24) month period if circumstances, unique to the acquisition of the right of way, prevent the acquisition of the above-stated percentage of right of way.

Section 5. City Rights and Obligations

A Prior to award the Project for construction by the County, the City shall pay the

County for all costs to be reimbursed by the City to the County, including additional funds due from the City for enhancements and improvements that are not Eligible Project Costs, required to satisfy the City's obligation under this Agreement.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-31

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS VACATING AND ABANDONING CERTAIN DESCRIBED STREET RIGHT-OF-WAY PREVIOUSLY DEDICATED TO THE PUBLIC THROUGH PLAT OF THE TOWN OF RICHMOND RECORDED IN THE REAL PROPERTY RECORDS OF FORT BEND COUNTY, TEXAS; DECLARING THAT SUCH RIGHT-OF-WAY IS UNNECESSARY FOR USE BY THE PUBLIC; AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE A DEED WITHOUT WARRANTY RELEASING AND ASSIGNING THE REAL PROPERTY TO FORT BEND COUNTY; PROVIDING A SEVERABILTY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

The City of Richmond, Texas ("the City") is a home rule city acting under its power adopted by the electorate pursuant to Article XI, Section 5 of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 9 of the Local Government Code.

In early 1837, Robert Eden Handy and William Lusk platted the town of Richmond dedicating street rights-of-way, specifically, the portion of Third Street between Fort Street and Austin Street, between Blocks 50 and 51 of the City of Richmond, ("the right-of-way to be abandoned"), to the Public through a plat recorded at Volume A, Page 62 of the Deed Records of Fort Bend County, Texas.

Fort Bend County has requested that such portion of Third Street be abandoned for use in the campus of the County's proposed Emergency Operations Center.

The City Commission of the City of Richmond, after careful study and consideration, has determined that the use as a part of the County's Emergency Operation Center campus would better serve the public.

In order to remove any question as to the continued interest in the right-of-way to be abandoned, the City desires to execute a deed without warranty releasing and assigning all title and control in the right-of-way to be abandoned to the Fort Bend County; **NOW**, **THEREFORE**,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Contingent on Fort Bend County's approval of the Interlocal Agreement for 10th Street, the City Commission finds that the street right-of-way described in the legal description attached to this Ordinance as Exhibit A ("the right-of-way to be abandoned"), which is a portion of the Third Street right-of-way dedicated to the Public through a plat

recorded at Volume A, Page 62 of the Deed Records of Fort Bend County, Texas, Texas, will better serve the public as a portion of the campus of the Fort Bend County Emergency Operations Center.

SECTION 2. The Mayor of the City of Richmond, Texas, is hereby authorized and empowered, upon receipt of the signed Interlocal Agreement for the improvements to Tenth Street, to execute a deed without warranty to the right-of-way to be abandoned, which deed is attached to this Ordinance as Exhibit B, to the Fort Bend County.

SECTION 3. After the deed without warranty is executed, the City Secretary is authorized and instructed to file it in the deed records of Fort Bend County, Texas.

SECTION 4. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the City Council that the phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of this ordinance are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by the valid judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and sections of this ordinance, since the same would have been enacted by the City Council without the incorporation in this ordinance of any such unconstitutional phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and its passage, and approval.

SYNOPSIS

The City has been working to establish quiet zones for the last four years with two different Railroad entities, Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) and Union Pacific (UP). BNSF quiet zone involved median improvements and signage which has been completed and the notice of establishment has been sent in January of this year. UP rail crossings involve a median upgrade on Collins and additional curbing and wayside horn installations at 6 other locations. The median upgrade on Collins and additional curbing has been completed. This agenda request is for the construction and installation of the wayside horns.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2019 GOALS ADDRESSED

Rehabilitate and preserve Richmond's existing neighborhoods and community assets.

BACKGROUND

In 2017, the City in conjunction with Fort Bend County and Rosenberg, completed a diagnostic study with CTC, Inc. to determine what additional safety measures would be needed to establish quiet zones for BNSF and UP rail lines that run through Richmond. In 2018, the city hired TransSystems Engineering to complete the design for both quiet zones based on the outcome of the diagnostic study. The resulting design was broken up into basically two projects, the concrete median and curbing work and installation of the wayside horns. As mentioned, the concrete portion of the project is completed, and wayside horn installations and signage are remaining.

The City solicited a sole source proposal from RioTech (formerly CTC. Inc.) to install the wayside horn installations at Douglas, 10th, 8th, 6th, 4th, and Second street. UP is working in parallel to upgrade their equipment and circuitry to accommodate the new wayside horns. RioTech works closely with the rail lines and has installed the other wayside horn systems in the County.

The proposal to install six (6) wayside horn installations is \$398,724.60 and the estimated construction time is 180 days from notice to proceed.


