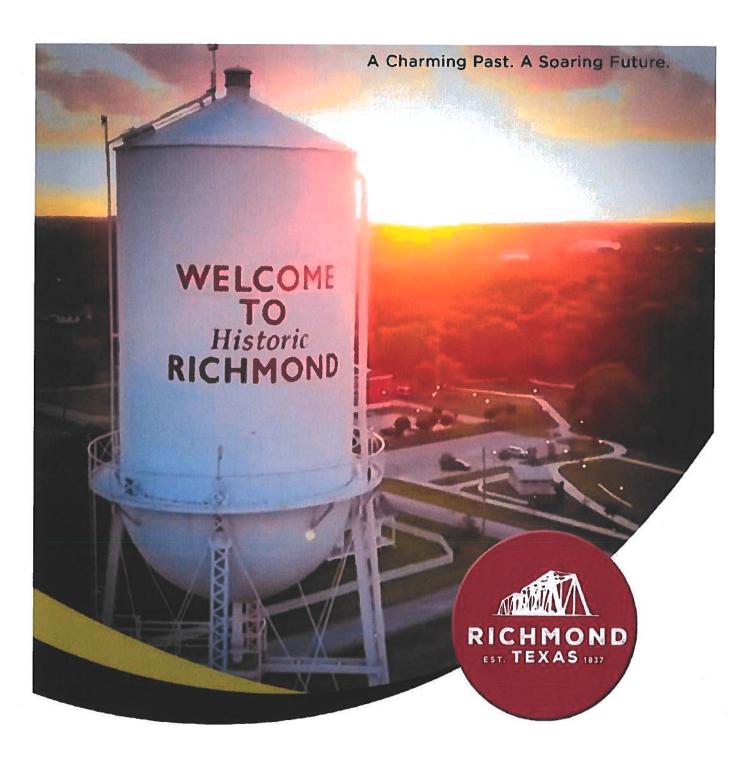

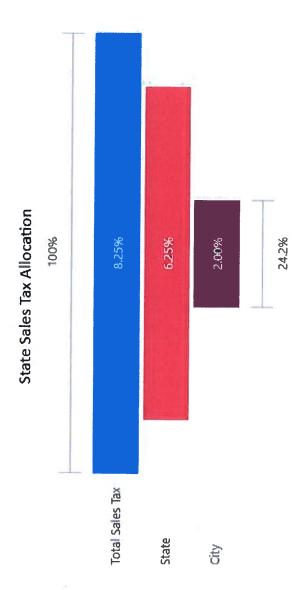


Executive Summary

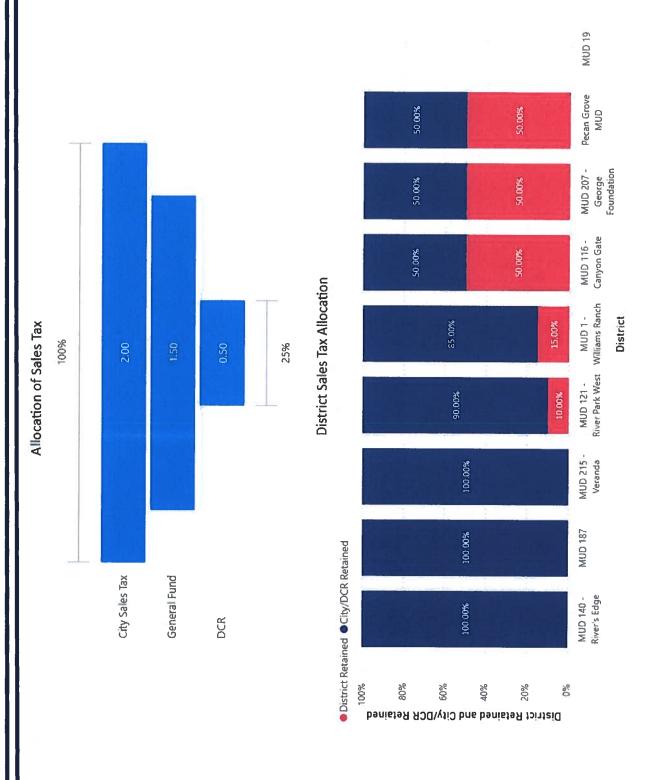
Sales tax is one of the most important revenue streams for the City, but it's also highly volatile and subject to risk. This analysis is intended to highlight the City's sales tax collections in comparison to its expected performance, which is the amount of revenue received compared to the budget.

In Texas, the State Comptroller's Office receives sales tax two months before it is remitted to the City, as a result there is a two-month timing difference between the State collection of revenue and the revenue sent to the City. This report covers sales tax payments received by the City from the Texas Comptroller's Office in the month of April, which reflects sales tax collections for the month of February.

remitted to the City. Consistent with the comprehensive master plan, the City has entered into several strategic partnership agreements (SPAs) that allow for MUDs). As a result of these agreements, after the City remits the MUDs proportional share of its sales tax, the City then remits 25% of the remaining sales tax The total sales tax rate within Richmond is 8.25%, of that total, 6.25% is collected and retained by the Texas Comptroller's office, and the remaining 2% is collected within the City, these strategic partnership agreements provide for, in most cases, some sharing of the sales tax revenue (between the City and limited purpose annexation and the collection of sales tax within certain municipal utility districts (MUDs). While the City receives 100% of the sales tax to the Development Corporation and retains 75% in the General Fund.

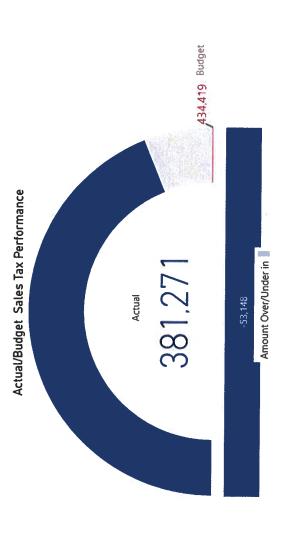

City Current Month at a Glance

The graphs below indicate that City sales tax collections are \$381,271 in April, compared to the budget allocation of \$434,419. The total collections are under budget by \$-53,148, which is -12.23% lower than expected. This month a one-time positive audit adjustment in the amount \$14,849 was received.





City Year-to-Date at a Glance

The graphs below indicate that total sales tax collections are \$3,313,063 for the fiscal year, compared to the budgeted sales tax of \$3,069,500. April is the seventh month in the 2021 fiscal year, therefore collections will continue to increase with the passing of each subsequent month. The City will accumulate and monitor any excess sales tax revenue and will recognize any actual gains at the end of the year once all revenues have been received. This approach helps minimize the month to month volatility of collections.

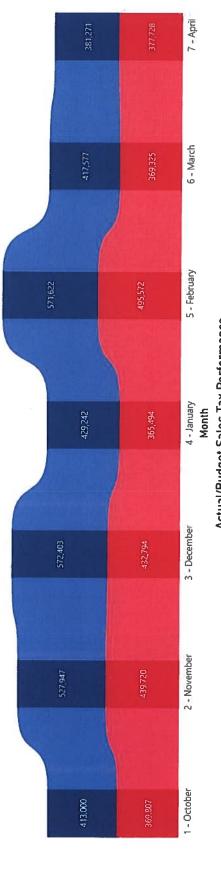




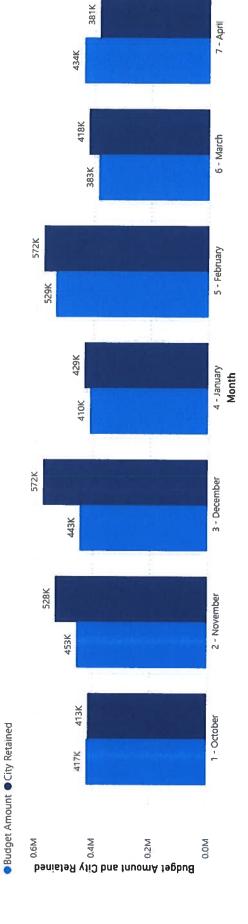
City Historical Performance



Prior Year City Retained

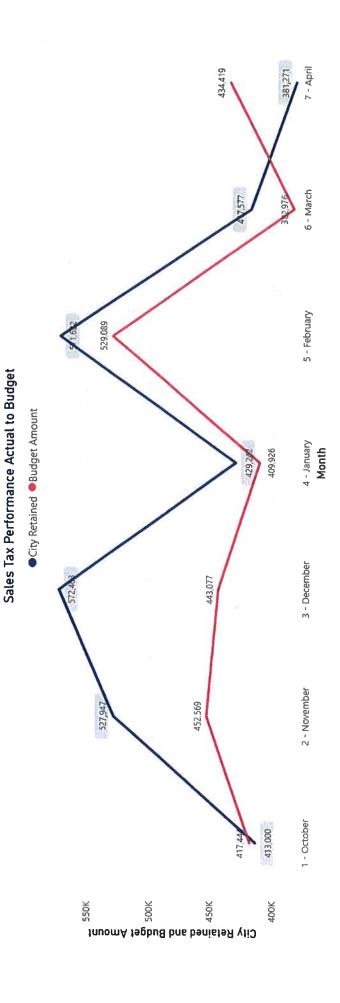


Actual/Budget Sales Tax Performance







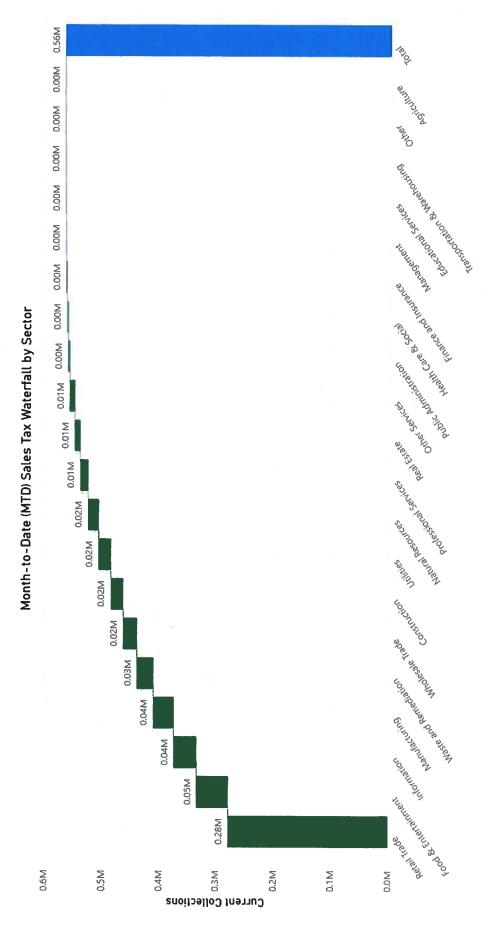




Monthly Payment Allocation by Sector

Monthly Analysis Compared to Prior Year

The Retail Trade and Food & Entertainment Sectors are the primary industry sectors for the City and combined make up approximately 55% of the total collections. The sectors described in this analysis below make-up approximately 90% of the total collections for the City,

year-over-year in the General Merchandise subsector. Most of the increase in this sector appears to be driven by grocery related purchases and online retailers. Retail: The Retail sector increased by 14.91% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The increase is the result of timing and better performance

Food & Entertainment: The Food & Entertainment sector decreased by -1.31% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The majority of these collections come from Restaurants & Food Services; therefore, it is likely that this month's collections were impacted by the winter freeze event.

Information: The Information sector decreased by -12.28% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The telecommunication and broadcast subsectors accounted for most of the decrease. Natural Resources: The Natural Resources sector decreased by -57.32% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The decrease in this sector is the result of an industry closely tied to Construction. Collections in this sector should be treated as one-time collections due to the volatility of the subsectors' collections Professional Services: The Professional Services sector increased by 10.28% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The increase in collections is related to online service-oriented businesses. Utilities: The Utility sector increased by 43.09% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The increase is likely related to increased utility usage and prices through the winter freeze event.

Wholesale Trade: The Wholesale Trade sector decreased 30.39% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The decrease occurred with equipment company businesses in the Durable goods subsector. A majority of these businesses don't maintain a physical presence within the City,

Waste & Remediation: The Waste & Remediation sector increased by 9.96% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The increase in collections occurred primarily in the Administrative & Support Services subsector.

Computer and Electronic and Machinery subsector and staff is reviewing the collections. The increase in collections is driven by a company that does not have a Manufacturing: The Manufacturing sector Increased by 10.63% when compared to the same period in the prior year. The increase in collections occurred in the physical presence in the City.

The City budgets sales tax on a conservative basis because collections are extremely volatile in nature. The graph above highlights the monthly volatility in sales

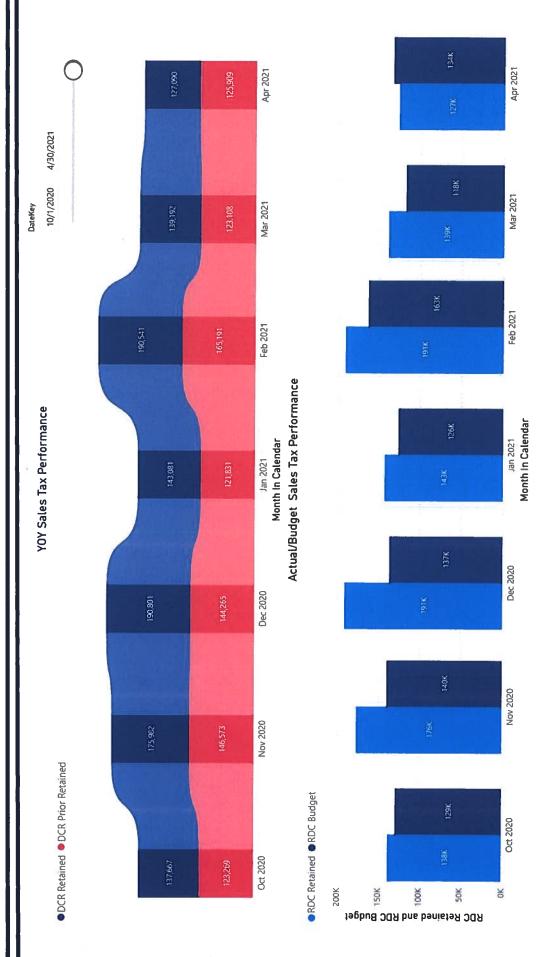

Sales Tax Background

Sales tax is an important but volatile revenue stream for the City, and it is closely monitored and analyzed.

Understanding how the City develops the sales tax forecast is an important part of this publication. This year the sales tax forecast utilized a conservative approach of an approximate 3% increase from the previous budget to maintain modest fiscal expectations.

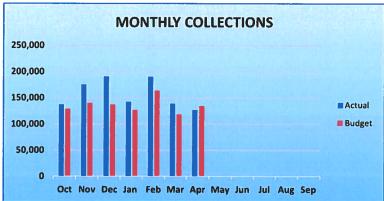

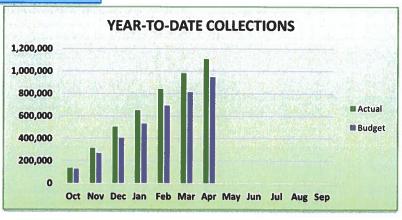

First of all, I want to thank the Development Corporation of Richmond for being so generous as to support the preservation efforts of the Fort Bend History Association for so many years. Since 2016, the financial support from the DCR has mainly been focused on the restoration of the 1901 Richmond Depot and other projects in Decker Heritage Park right here in downtown Richmond.

These are some of the accomplishments:

- 2016: damaged flooring was replaced in the depot
- 2017: new picket fence installed at Decker Heritage Park, electricity and lights installed in the depot
- 2018: HVAC system installed in the depot and utilities hooked up in three buildings in the park: depot, McNabb House, gazebo
- 2019: plumbing installed in the depot

While not all of the funds received for these project was obtained from the DCR, a significant amount can be attributed to your generosity – thank you!

As we seek to preserve and utilize the historic properties with which we have been blessed, maintenance is an ongoing issue. In anticipation of the grand reopening of the Fort Bend Museum after an extensive renovation, the Moore Home and the McFarlane properties are getting a facelift as well. The cost for painting and roofing the Moore Home alone is going to come close to \$70,000, the amount that we received from a local foundation for *all* our preservation efforts this year. That means that we are having to dip into our operating budget to cover other expenses, such as fixing the pipe and wall damage from the recent freeze, the repainting of the McFarlane fence, landscaping for pathways at Decker Park and the replacement of the Moore Home fence.

Local volunteers have stepped up to help us with issues at the McFarlane administrative building. So far, we have only had to spend money for lumber (\$879) and paint (\$288) on the fence, but we will likely have to hire someone to paint the shutters, and the deductible on our insurance for plumbing repairs will



be \$1,000. Would it be possible for the Development Corporation of Richmond to help us out with a grant of \$3,500 to help with these repairs? This project is small but will make a big difference on our corner of 5th and Jackson Street!

Regional Partnerships

- Meet with Kristin Weiss CEO & President of Central Fort Bend and Keri Schmidt from Fort Bend Chamber to discuss the Richmond's Economic Development Week "Richmond Means Transportation". Both have assisted with making sure this breakfast is considered a success.
- Met with Jeff Wiley from Fort Bend EDC to discuss Richmond and its position in Fort Bend County. We discussed the need for increased quality projects in the Richmond area that would pay high wages and serve as quality jobs. We also discussed the favorable future of Fort Bend EDC and its relationship with regards to Richmond.

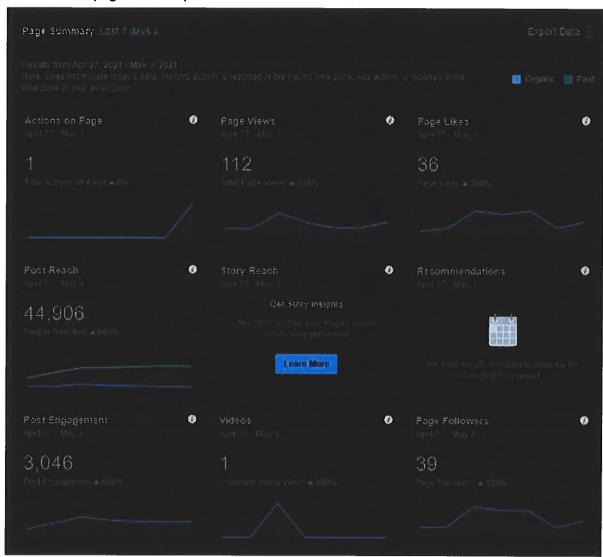

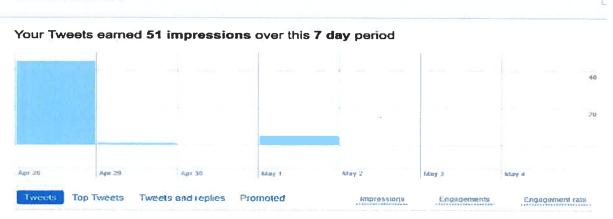

We will partner with Fort Bend Museum (Claire Rogers) and host an open-air event at the museum. We will have our partners set up tables, invite our tourist attractions, food

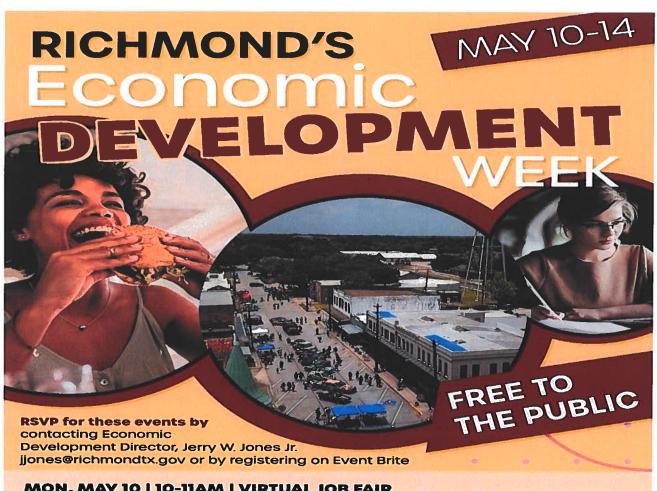
trucks, and restaurants to set up tables and serve samples of what they serve at their locations.
