



Planning Department

SYNOPSIS

The City of Richmond is committed to adopting and implementing the Best Practices for Beautification and prioritization of up-to-date plans and studies within the City and specific areas of the City. The City of Richmond participates in the Scenic City Certification Program (SCCP), one of the programs run by Scenic Texas. Richmond has been a part of the SCCP since 2016 with an original award of Bronze with a rank up to Platinum in 2019. The City is also exploring the option of preparing a submittal to the Livable Centers Program, selected candidates participate in a study which identifies and considers quality of life adjustments for ways an area such as increase options for modes of transportation, improve environmental quality, pedestrian safety, promote economic development and housing diversity.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2014 GOALS ADDRESSED

The Comprehensive Master Plan recommends the implementation of beautification objectives and priorities.

- C. Strengthen transportation connections and increase choices between ways to travel.
- F. Rehabilitate and preserve Richmond's existing neighborhoods and community assets.
- I. Enhance and preserve Richmond's natural amenities.

BACKGROUND

SCENIC TEXAS

SCCP has been developed and applied to put in place a foundation of scenic standards and planning practices that may advance sustainability via environmental education, conservation and ecosystem management. By following the best practices as identified in the SCCP the result is the improvement of outdoor spaces and overall well-being citizens of Texas.

To evaluate applications for recognition by Scenic Texas as a Scenic Certified City, ten (10) areas (Visual Tenets) are reviewed for conformance to Best Practices² in the following areas:

10 Visual Tenets Definitions and Key Elements

- 1) Streetscape Enhancements
- 2) Parks, Trails and Public Space
- 3) Lighting Standards
- 4) Design Integrity
- 5) Landscaping
- 6) Sign Control: (on and off premises)
- 7) Litter and Graffiti Prohibition
- 8) Utility and Cable Line Programs
- 9) Dumpster Screening
- 10) Unique Municipal Features and Special Programs

In 2023 Richmond submitted an application for the Scenic City of the Year. The City of Richmond was in the top 13 cities out of all applications. Staff will be submitting an application for year 2024 for the opportunity to showcase the City of Richmond.

Livable Centers Study

Livable Centers are defined as places where people can live work and play with less reliance on cars. The concept is based on the encouragement of complementary mix of land uses designed for walkability, connectivity and accessibility via expanded modes of transportation from bikes, buses, foot traffic, as well as automobiles.

The livable Centers Program contains four (4) Goals which are the following:

• <u>Create multi-modal travel choices</u> that improve connectivity between existing neighborhoods and activity centers using multiple modes of transportation.

- <u>Create resilient quality places</u> that integrate enjoyable green spaces and preserve natural resources while considering elements of hazard recovery, mitigation, and resiliency.
- <u>Promote safe and equitable infrastructure</u> that reduces the negative impacts of defined barriers to pedestrians and bicyclists (e.g. intersections, highways, railroads, water ways, network gaps, etc.).
- <u>Promote economic development and housing diversity</u> by increasing walkability near activity centers and connecting existing infrastructure to serve as a catalyst for investment/development.

STUDY TYPES

The program offers two (2) separate study types:

- Livable Centers Study
- Focused Livable Centers Study

The Livable Centers Study serves as a small area plan to carry out all four Livable Centers Program goals. The goals are assessed on a community-wide scale that is defined by the study sponsors and may include larger neighborhoods or series of neighborhoods in a single service area. The study areas can define multiple locations or nodes of interest including areas that have been identified for future land-use improvements.

Focused Livable Centers Study are targeted, community node studies that must meet two (2) Livable Centers Program goals to create multi-modal travel choices, resilient places, and one additional Livable Centers goal that best fits the needs of the study sponsor.

INTRODUCTION

The City of Richmond is working on the continued participation in the Scenic City Certification Program. For continuance of the Platinum rank status the Planning Department will complete and submit recertification this month. Additionally, Staff is working on an application for the Livable Centers Program, under the Houston Galveston Area Council, the program is to allow for additional modes of transportation within an area by analyzing auto-centric infrastructure, policies, and programs.

SCENIC CITY CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

Scenic Texas is a statewide 501(c)(3) non-profit organization dedicated to preserving and enhancing Texas' visual environment¹. The non-profit has a number of programs and initiatives aimed at preserving and enhancing Texas' visual environment. The City of Richmond participates in the Scenic City Certification Program (SCCP), one of the programs run by Scenic Texas. Richmond has been a part of the SCCP since 2016 with an original award of Bronze with a rank up to Platinum in 2019. The SCCP provides a tool for cities within Texas to assess, evaluate and be provided recognition for development standards.

Texas cities may apply for the Scenic City Certification Program to be assessed on applicable municipal ordinances. The applications will be assessed and receive a grade which will indicate compliance with Best Practices as identified by the SCCP. SCCP has been developed and applied to put in place a foundation of scenic standards and planning practices that may advance sustainability via environmental education, conservation and ecosystem management. By following the best practices as identified in the SCCP the result is the improvement of outdoor spaces and overall well-being citizens of Texas.

The application process has been crafted in a way that provides cities the opportunity to ensure they are adopting strong and enforceable ordinances to prioritize outcomes in the municipality. An application is submitted with the current language and existing ordinances which is preliminarily reviewed by a qualified third party. Once a review has been completed the applicant is provided with a score and feedback on the submitted documentation. The city then has a chance to consider provided feedback before submission of



a final application. This process allows improvement for the city to provide modifications for a final score in which the city may craft future ordinances and regulations to the Best Practices as identified by the SCCP.

To evaluate applications for recognition by Scenic Texas as a Scenic Certified City, ten (10) areas (Visual Tenets) are reviewed for conformance to Best Practices² in the following areas:

10 Visual Tenets Definitions and Key Elements²

1) Streetscape Enhancements:

Streetscapes that are designed for all users including pedestrians, bikers, and motor traffic.

- Trees and landscaping along major roadways, streets, and medians.
- Pedestrian friendly sidewalks.

2) Parks, Trails and Public Space:

A connected system of green space that is available and accessible to all community members.

- A comprehensive system of parks, greenbelts, and open space that is accessible to residents.
- Parks include natural and manmade amenities that align with community preferences.
- Park land dedication for future developments.
- Limited impervious cover in open space areas.

3) Lighting Standards:

Lighting that promotes public safety and limits light pollution that is undesirable to humans and harmful to wildlife.

- Selection of lighting location and equipment that provide visibility, safety, and security.
- Adequate illumination for level of use.
- Lighting program that emphasizes directional lighting.
- Cost-sharing program between city and electric provider to upgrade fixtures.

4) Design Integrity:

A clearly defined sense of place that sets a framework for incoming business and residential developments to abide by to maintain the existing community character.

- Clearly stated design standards that are in place to ensure coordination of individual efforts.
- Storefront design standards based on shapes and materials.
- Signage limitation for on-premises displays.
- Exterior design and landscaping requirements.

5) Landscaping:

Well placed and selected plants to enhance beauty, separation of use, and stormwater control.

- Appropriately scaled landscaping to screen parking areas.
- Required landscaping in islands with curbs.
- If paving around trees, used porous pavement.
- Plant selection must be appropriate for climate region.

6) Sign Control: (on and off premises)

Signage restrictions intended to protect the community character and wildlife while not overburdening businesses.

- Thoughtful limits on size, placement, and quantity of signs for businesses.
- Require permits for permanent signage.



- Restrict wind devices, roof, and portable signage.
- Restrict electronic signage.
- Plan to bring grandfathered signage into conformity with code.
 - Management of existing signs and removal of signage when damaged or otherwise appropriate.
 - No new outdoor off-premises signs, no relocation of existing off-premises signs.
 - No vehicles placed for the primary purpose of advertising.
 - No advertisements on right-of-way amenities or public properties.
 - No tree-cutting or clearing to better view of off-premises signage.

7) Litter and Graffiti Prohibition:

Appropriate management and removal of litter and graffiti.

- Littering is prohibited and penalized.
- Graffiti is prohibited and penalized.
- Dumping is prohibited and penalized.
- Clean-up efforts.
- Public trash receptacles available and include protective lid.
- Trash placed for collection only 15 hours before or after specific collection days.

8) Utility and Cable Line Programs:

Program in place to ensure that new and replaced utility and cable lines are placed underground when possible.

- New utility lines to be installed underground when possible.
- Replacement of damaged utility lines should be installed underground.

9) Dumpster Screening:

Dumpsters are effectively screened and constructed of masonry material.

- All trash and bulk containers require screening.
- Be constructed from masonry material.
- The opening of screen be faced away from sidewalks and streets.

10) Unique Municipal Features and Special Programs:

Adopted ordinances, plans, or programs that contribute to scenic standards but fall outside the boundaries of the SCCP application. These may include, but are not limited to:

- historic districts or historic preservation program
- a scenic program related to a unique geographic feature
- a natural environment enhancement program
- storm runoff collectors
- innovative programs above and beyond the criteria in any of the certification categories
- active chapter in good standing with Keep Texas Beautiful
- current participation in Texas Historical Commission's Texas Main Street Program

Certification as part of the SCCP provides several benefits to participating cities. These benefits include expert evaluation of existing standards and ordinances, exceptional regulations that provide a foundation for the review and approval of development plans, use as a platform for educating citizens regarding the influence regulations exert on a community. Cities recognized by this program are able to communicate and expand on ideas to promote scenic standards across a region.





As a Platinum member of SCCP the City of Richmond is exhibiting exceptional ordinances and applications of the Best Practices identified by the Scenic City Certification Program. The Comprehensive Master Plan objectives state "Establish a vision that guides the future growth and enhancement of the community." By utilizing the Best Practices from the Scenic City Certification Program the City of Richmond is in alignment with the Comprehensive Master Plan objective stated above and the Unified Development Code Section 1.1.102.3.f Enhancing the visual character of the City through the regulation of design where such design is appropriate. The City of Richmond is working on a recertification submittal to be completed and submitted this month for continuance of the Platinum rank status. Continued participation in the Scenic City Certification Program exhibits the City of Richmond's commitment to maintain exemplary standards for outdoor spaces.

In 2023 Richmond submitted an application for the Scenic City of the Year. The City of Richmond was in the top 13 cities out of all applications. Staff will be submitting an application for year 2024 for the opportunity to showcase the City of Richmond.

LIVABLE CENTERS PROGRAM

Livable Centers Program was established in 2008 under the Houston Galveston Area Council. The program looks to re-envision auto-centric infrastructure, policies and programs to allow for additional modes of transportation within an area. Livable Centers are defined as places where people can live work and play with less reliance on their cars. The concept is based on the encouragement of complementary mix of land uses designed for walkability, connectivity and accessibility via expanded modes of transportation from bikes, buses, foot traffic, as well as automobiles.

The Livable Centers Program is part of a Houston Galveston Area Councils initiative to address H-GACs 2045 Regional Transportation Plan. As part of the initiative, reduction in vehicular trips is an area of focus to reduce the burden on the region's transportation network. The livable Centers Program contains four (4) Goals which are the following:

- <u>Create multi-modal travel choices</u> that improve connectivity between existing neighborhoods and activity centers using multiple modes of transportation.
- <u>Create resilient quality places</u> that integrate enjoyable green spaces and preserve natural resources while considering elements of hazard recovery, mitigation, and resiliency.
- **Promote safe and equitable infrastructure** that reduces the negative impacts of defined barriers to pedestrians and bicyclists (e.g. intersections, highways, railroads, water ways, network gaps, etc.).
- Promote economic development and housing diversity by increasing walkability near activity centers and connecting existing infrastructure to serve as a catalyst for investment/development.⁴



The program partners with local communities to identify specific recommendations including walking, biking and other modes of transportation to help the creation of livable centers. This is completed by conducting a study which will have participation from City Staff, sponsor officials, the local community, and potential project partners.

The goals are assessed on a community-wide scale that is defined by the study sponsors and may include larger neighborhoods or series of neighborhoods in a single service area. The study areas can define multiple locations or nodes of interest including areas that have been identified for future land-use improvements.

Focused Livable Centers Study are targeted, community node studies that must meet two (2) Livable Centers Program goals to create multi-modal travel choices, resilient places, and one additional Livable Centers goal that best fits the needs of the study sponsor. ³




SYNOPSIS


Five Year Target Goal: In the next five (5) years, the City expects continued population growth and development. Water conservation is a priority of our public education efforts. The City expects a 1% reduction in current gallons per capita day (gpcd) usage. Based on a five (5) year potable consumption average of 111 gpcd, this translates to an approximate per capita reduction of 1.0 gpcd and 110 gpcd at the five (5) year target mark.

Mayor Haas called the meeting to order at 9:02 a.m

A8. Consent Agenda

Commissioner Beard- selected Police, Municipal, Finance, Public Works, Planning, and Code Enforcement departments

- **PD-** The discussion included the issue of traffic being redirected from Richmond Parkway, leading to increased speeding on Dowling. Assistant Police Chief Brzozowski mentioned that efforts would be made to install a portable speed limit monitor today. Additionally, there were questions about possible ongoing SA investigations and the report on confiscated narcotics report, which will be covered in a separate discussion.
- **Muni** Court Administrator Carol Trujillo provided an update on the Safe Harbor event. She reported that 53 cases were addressed during the event and mentioned that she would share more details in the next meeting.
- **Finance** Finance Director Preza mentioned that a detailed conversation on sales tax is scheduled for the Spring Retreat. Additionally, there was a short discussion about the potential development of a policy concerning the sales tax revenue collected by the city.
- PW- An update on the East Water Treatment Plant is expected to be provided in the future. Additionally, there was
 mention of a potential meeting initiated by the Executive Director of the Fort Bend History Association to explore
 opportunities related to Decker Park. Commissioner Beard suggested that Kending-Keast should participate in this
 meeting.
- **Planning-** Commissioner Beard requested that commercial and residential information be clearly distinguished. Additionally, he recommended including potential job creation estimates for new commercial projects in the predevelopment phase information.
- Code Enforcement- An update was requested concerning the building on Dowling Drive, which is presently

involved in a municipal case and may pose a potential hazard. The conversation also touched on the issue of dead trees, which staff will provide Commissioner Beard with the policy on dead trees.

City Manager Vela mentioned she would look into the matter further and offer more details before tonight's meeting.
- A10. Review and consider taking action on Ordinance No. 2024-04, canceling a general election for the purpose of electing a Commissioner to Position 1 and electing a Commissioner to Position 3 and Declaring the Unopposed Candidates Elected.
 - No discussion. Both Commissioners will be appointed for another 3-year term.

- This item is a part of A-12 which was unanimously approved.
- Commissioner Gaul moved to approve Ordinance No. 2024-05, a request by Scott Reeve, Core Land Surveying, representing property owner DGV Group 1 Richmond LLC to close and abandon the following public right-of-way as defined in Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B" subject to the condition that the property owner pay to the City the fair market value of the property released by the city in any action involving the closure, reduction or alteration of any public street, alley, or other public way, pursuant to Municipal Code Chapter 28, Article V, Section 28-301 (c). Commissioner Beard seconded. Motion passes unanimously.

A15. Review and consider taking action on authorizing City Manager to execute contract for utilities project on 90A.

- The HWY 90 Utility Construction Project received four bids, with Vera Industries LLC being the lowest qualified bidder at \$873,369.50. Concerns about the low bid were addressed; the contractor's ownership of equipment and positive reviews were noted, alongside advice to monitor the project's progress. Staff also verified the bid amount as correct.
- Commissioner Drozd moved to authorize the City Manager to execute a Construction Services Contract with Vera Industries, LLC in the amount of \$873,369.50 for the City of Richmond Highway 90A Commercial Utilities Project.

A16. Review and consider taking action on Resolution No. 479-2024, adopting updated Water Conservation and Drought Contingency Plan.

- Joe Reyes presented stating the city must update its Water Conservation and Drought Contingency Plan every five years. The proposed Water Conservation Plan and resolution are due to the TCEQ by May 1, 2024. The update primarily includes statistical data about the City's utility system and revisions to the Drought Contingency Plan include new subdivisions added within the last five years. The updated plan was distributed to the City Commission today. It was reiterated from this morning's meeting to have a comparison of water consumption and wastewater usage between the previous five-year plan and the current one to analyze the trends and implications. Also, a statement was made to indicate for next year that the City Commission vote on enforcement techniques to manage water usage during drought conditions. Additionally, it was proposed that, in the coming year, the City Commission consider voting on and implementing enforcement strategies aimed at regulating water consumption during periods of drought. a future agenda item to compare the last five years' water and drought plans with current ones, highlighting any changes.
- Commissioner Gaul moved to accept Resolution No. 479-2024, adopting an updated Water Conservation and Drought Contingency Plan. Commissioner Drozd seconded. Motion passes unanimously.

A17. Review and discuss Ordinance No. 2024-06, permitting/allowing golf carts on roadways, shared use paths, and sidewalks.

Chief Craig discussed this Ordinance aimed at promoting wider mobility choices by allowing the regulated
use of certain vehicles on specified city streets. He received feedback from the City Commission and noted
that the topic, including a map highlighting key areas of interest regarding cross-streets and restricted
access zones, would be revisited in next month's meeting. No action was taken.

A18. Review and discuss agenda packet, identify key elements and crucial information that should be included in the information.

The City Commission was asked for suggestions to improve the packet's efficiency. Ideas proposed were
to deliver the agenda packet earlier, incorporate executive summaries, condense and target the content
to what is essential for decision-making, and consider creating a secondary, public-accessible packet. No
action taken.



Re: Activity Report for March 2024

Mayor and Commissioners,

The Training Division strives to conduct a variety of trainings each month so that our members are prepared for any task or emergency. The trainings cover a broad area of the fire service including fire suppression, fire prevention, rescue operations, hazardous materials response, and emergency medical services. These educational opportunities are accomplished using combinations of department, shift, crew, and individual level instruction. The goal for all trainings is to provide a safe platform for our members to improve and advance their knowledge in the fire service that will better prepare the Richmond Fire Department for the future and to propel each member's career development forward.

During the month of March, the Training Division began the FTO for Probationary Firefighters Abraham Melgar and Bryar Blair. The Orientation portion of the FTO was held the week of March 4th prior to the new hires being assigned to shift. Both firefighters performed during the orientation phase and have a great work ethic that will be a welcome addition to the fire department. Phase 2 of their FTO will begin on March 10th where they will continue to complete their FTO Task Book while gaining on the job experience under close supervision from their assigned lieutenant.

The department sent a few chief officers to the Texas Fire Chief's Annual Conference. The conference delivered updates on new regulations and provided an atmosphere where fellow fire service leaders could ask questions and seek advice on how to handle developing situations. Some of these situations included staffing issues, best practices, leadership development, and EMS in the fire service.

The Training Division also conducted another firefighter hiring process to fill vacancies within the operations division. The department received three applicants. Of the three applicants, only one showed to participate in the assessment process. At the conclusion of the assessment process, the applicant did not receive a job offer due to the outcome of the assessment. Eight vacancies remain in the operations division.

The department logged 799 hours of training for the month of March. Looking forward to the month of April, the Training Division will participate in a county wide RIT/Mayday training drill. The Training Division is also preparing to send four members to FDIC to experience new technology within the fire service and to attend training courses offered by nationally recognized instructors.





STREET PROJECT UPDATES

ST001 – 10th Street Extension

• The County has closed on 23 properties out of 43. Three (3) Properties are in eminent domain proceedings. Demolition permits have been submitted to Code Enforcement.

FRONT STREET PROJECT UPDATES

Front Street

• Contractor is back on the job and detour is in place for work on Richmond Parkway. Contractor has been locating underground conflicts with proposed storm sewer construction.

PARK PROJECT UPDATES

PK007 – Clay Street/Second street Drainage and Sidewalk Project

• Construction contract approved, work to begin in October. Long lead time for outfall equipment and notice to proceed will be end of April. Working with the County to include the roundabout into this contract.

OTHER PROJECT UPDATES

WW2102 - East Wastewater Plant

• Consultant working through permit process with TCEQ and design for expansion and property owner for easement acquisition. City staff will be assisting with the environmental evaluation by potholing potential easement locations. Staff and consultant are considering alternate routes for outfall.

ST2201 - Street Rehabilitation

• 100% design has been submitted for review. City has an inter local agreement with the County for mobility funds. Project is budgeted for bid next fiscal year.

SW2201 - New Groundwater Well

Working with the design consultant to define the full scope of work. To be able to mix with surface water we
will need to conduct a CT (contact time) study and revise to submit to the TCEQ for approval. One easement
needed for the sanitary control located on adjacent property has been identified by the state as having
contaminated groundwater. Staff is looking for alternative locations for the new well.

WW2302 South WWTP

• TCEQ approved re-rating the facility to 1.22 MGD. Design for the full expansion 2.2 MGD is 100% complete. Construction contract awarded first of August and contractor has mobilized at the WWTP.

Utility Expansion for Development on Williams Way

• Water line is complete, lift station is approximately 85% complete.

WW2201 - Wastewater Reuse Expansion

• Construction contract awarded in October. Contractor submitting final submittals for review. Construction staking to begin in April.

MU2305 - City Hall Generator

• Construction Contract approved in October, generator slab and underground have been installed. Generator due in November of 2024.

WW2205 Winston Water Well Rehabilitation

This agenda item and Ordinance seeks City Commission consideration in encouraging broader mobility options through the reasonable and responsible use of golf carts, neighborhood electric vehicles, and off-highway vehicles on designated streets within the city.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN GOALS ADDRESSED

C. Strengthen transportation connections and increase choices between ways to travel.


BACKGROUND

The Texas Transportation Code grants municipalities the authority to control the operation of motor vehicles using its streets and to prescribe reasonable and safe restrictions related to the operation, stopping, standing, and parking of vehicles.

Chapter 551A of the Texas Transportation Code authorizes a municipality to regulate the use of golf carts, Neighborhood Electric Vehicles (NEV), and off-highway vehicles.

The proposed ordinance identifies proper operation, equipment, state regulations, and prohibited vehicle operations due to safety considerations.

ORDINANCE NO. 2024-06

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS, ADOPTING ARTICLE V "GOLF CARTS, NEIGHBORHOOD ELECTRIC VEHICLES, AND OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLES" TO CHAPTER 32 "TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES," OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS, TO ALLOW AND REGULATE THE OPERATION OF GOLF CARTS, NEIGHBORHOOD ELECTRIC VEHICLES, AND OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLES ON CERTAIN PUBLIC STREETS; REPEALING CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; PROVIDING A PENALTY CLAUSE; INCLUDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

The Texas Transportation Code grants to municipalities the authority to control the operation of motor vehicles using its streets and to prescribe reasonable and safe restrictions related to the operation, stopping, standing, and parking of vehicles.

Chapters 551A of the Texas Transportation Code authorizes a municipality to regulate the use of golf carts, Neighborhood Electric Vehicles, and off-highway vehicles.

The City of Richmond, as a Home-rule municipality, has authority to provide reasonable regulation of such vehicles in addition to the authority granted to all municipalities by such statutes.

The City Commission desires to encourage broader mobility options through the reasonable and responsible use of golf carts and off-highway vehicles on streets within the City with a posted speed limit not exceeding 35 miles per hour, and the use of Neighborhood Electric Vehicles on streets with a posted speed limit not exceeding 45 miles per hour except where the City Commission determines that prohibiting such operation is necessary in the interest of safety.

The City Commission of the City of Richmond, Texas finds that it is in the public interest to allow the operation of golf carts, Neighborhood Electric Vehicles, and off-highway vehicles in a manner consistent with state law and such use will not be contrary to the best interests of the public health, safety, and welfare; **NOW, THEREFORE**,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS:

Section 1. The facts and recitations contained in the Preamble of this ordinance are hereby found and declared to be true and correct.

Section 2. Article V "Golf Carts, Neighborhood Electric Vehicles, and Off-Highway Vehicles," of Chapter 32 "Traffic and Vehicles," of the Code of Ordinances, City of Richmond, Texas is hereby adopted to read as follows:

"CHAPTER 32—TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES

. . . .

ARTICLE V. – GOLF CARTS, NEIGHBORHOOD ELECTRIC VEHICLES, AND OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLES

Sec. 32-101. Purpose

The purpose of this Article is to encourage broader mobility options by providing alternate means of transportation under circumstances that are reasonable, to encourage responsible use of alternate transportation, and to provide reasonable restrictions on the use of such alternate transportation by allowing and regulating the use of Golf Carts, Neighborhood Electric Vehicles, and Off-Highway Vehicles on certain public streets within the City.

Sec. 32-102. Definitions

In this Article:

- (a) All-Terrain Vehicle or ATV shall have the meaning provided in Section 551A.001(1), Texas Transportation Code, as amended, which, at the time of adoption of this Article, defines it as a motor vehicle that is:
 - (A) equipped with a seat or seats for the use of:
 - (i) the rider; and
 - (ii) a passenger if the motor vehicle is designed by the manufacturer to transport a passenger;
 - (B) designed to propel itself with three or more tires in contact with the ground;
 - (C) designed by the manufacturer for off-highway use;
 - (D) not designed by the manufacturer primarily for farming or lawn care; and
 - (E) not more than 50-74 inches wide.
- (b) *City* means the City of Richmond, Texas.
- (c) Daytime means the period beginning one-half hour before sunrise and ending one-half hour after sunset.
- (d) *Driver* means a person driving or having physical control over a vehicle, including but not limited to a Golf Cart, Neighborhood Electric Vehicle, and Off-Highway Vehicle.
- <u>(e)</u> Driver's license means an authorization issued by the Department of Public Safety, or equivalent governmental entity for another state or country, for operation of a motor vehicle. The term includes a temporary license or instruction permit and an occupational license.
- (e)(f) Financial responsibility has the meaning set forth in Texas Transportation Code § 601.051, as amended;

- (f)(g) Golf Cart shall have the meaning provided in Section 551.401, Texas Transportation Code, as amended which, at the time of adoption of this Article, defines it as a motor vehicle designed by the manufacturer primarily for use on a golf course. The term does not include motorized conveyances commonly referred to as ATVs, off-road vehicles (also known as ORVs), four-wheelers, mules, gators and design-altered golf carts which have been altered to allow them to travel at a speed greater than 25 miles per hour.
- (g)(h) Governmental purposes shall include the purposes set forth in Section 551A.058, Texas Transportation Code, and shall include other activities and purposes necessary or convenient to providing services from a governmental entity, such as, without limitation, street, drainage, water, wastewater, code enforcement, and public health functions.
- (h)(i) Neighborhood Electric Vehicle (NEV) shall have the meaning provided in Section 551.301, Texas Transportation Code, as amended, which, at the time of adoption of this Article, defines it as a vehicle that can attain a maximum speed of 35 miles per hour on a paved level surface and otherwise complies with Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard 500 (49 C.F.R. Section 571.500). The term does not include motorized conveyances commonly referred to as ATVs, off-road vehicles (also known as ORVs), four-wheelers, mules, gators and design-altered golf carts which have been altered to allow them to travel at a speed greater than 35 miles per hour.
- (i)(j) Nighttime means the period beginning one-half hour after sunset and ending one-half hour before sunrise.
- (j)(k) Off-Highway Vehicle shall have the meaning provided in Section 551A.001(1-d), Texas Transportation Code, as amended, which, at the time of adoption of this Article, defines it as:
 - (A) an All-Terrain Vehicle or Recreational Off-Highway Vehicle;
 - (B) a Sand Rail; or
 - (C) a Utility Vehicle.
- (k)(I) Operate means to drive or have physical control over a vehicle on a street or in a public area designated for motor vehicle use.
- (<u>l)(m)</u> Operator means any person driving and having physical control over a vehicle on a street or in a public area designated for motor vehicle use.
- (m)(n) Recreational Off-Highway Vehicle shall have the meaning provided in Section 551A.001(5), Texas Transportation Code, as amended, which, at the time of adoption of this Article, defines it as a motor vehicle that is:
 - (A) equipped with a seat or seats for the use of:
 - (i) the rider; and
 - (ii) a passenger or passengers, if the vehicle is designed by the manufacturer to transport a passenger or passengers;
 - (B) designed to propel itself with four or more tires in contact with the ground;

- (C) designed by the manufacturer for off-highway use by the Operator only; and
- (D) not designed by the manufacturer primarily for farming or lawn care. (n)(o) Sand Rail shall have the meaning provided in Section 551A.001(3), as amended, which, at the time of adoption of this Article, defines it as a vehicle that:
 - (A) is designed or built primarily for off-highway use in sandy terrains, including for use on sand dunes;
 - (B) has a tubular frame, an integrated roll cage, and an engine that is rearmounted or placed midway between the front and rear axles of the vehicle; and
 - (C) has a gross vehicle weight, as defined by Section 541.401, of:
 - (i) not less than 700 pounds; and
 - (ii) not more than 2,000 pounds.
- (o)(p) Street means a public roadway in the City by whatever name (e.g., road, alley, avenue, highway, route, boulevard, etc.) that is open to vehicular traffic.
- (p)(q) Utility Vehicle shall have the meaning provided in Section 551A.001(6), Texas Transportation Code, as amended, which, at the time of adoption of this Article, defines it as a motor vehicle that is not a Golf Cart, as defined by Section 551.401, or lawn mower and is:
 - (A) equipped with side-by-side seating for the use of the Operator and a passenger;
 - (B) designed to propel itself with at least four tires in contact with the ground;
 - (C) designed by the manufacturer for off-highway use only; and
 - (D) designed by the manufacturer primarily for utility work and not for recreational purposes.

Sec. 32-103. Limited operation

- (a) Subject to the limitations and requirements of this Chapter, the operation of a Golf Cart is allowed on the streets of the City, <u>designated</u> shared use paths, and <u>designated</u> sidewalks.
- (b) Subject to the limitations and requirements of this Chapter, an NEV and Off-Highway Vehicle may be operated on the streets of the City.
- (c) The operation of a Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle shall be prohibited on any street or highway in the state highway system, regardless of the speed limit, including Farm-to-Market Roads located within the corporate boundaries of the City. The state highway system includes but is not limited to U.S. Highway 59/Interstate 69 (main lanes, frontage roads, and connector roads), U.S. Highway 90A (main lanes, frontage roads, and connector roads), Farm-to-Market Road 1640, Farm-to-Market Road 2218, Farm-to-Market Road 359 (main lanes, frontage roads, and connector

- roads), Farm-to-Market Road 3155 (Collins to Preston to west city limits), Loop 762 (Austin Street) and Farm-to-Market Road 762 (Thompson Road). For the purposes of this ordinance, is not included in the prohibition.
- (d) A Golf Cart may not be driven across intersections where the cross street does not have <u>electronic_a</u> traffic controls <u>device</u> and has a posted speed limit of more than 35 miles per hour.
- (e) An NEV or an Off-Highway Vehicle may drive across intersections where the cross street has a posted speed limit of more than 45 miles per hour even if the cross street is otherwise a prohibited street under this article.
- (f) Nothing in this section shall apply to vehicles operating as permitted under Section 32-113 and Section 32-114 herein.

Sec. 32-104. Required equipment—Golf Cart

- (a) A Golf Cart operated under this article must be equipped at a minimum, with the following equipment as mandated by the Texas Transportation Code §551.4041, as amended, and/or required by the City to operate on permitted locations:
 - (1) Operational headlamps;
 - (2) Operational tail lamps;
 - (3) Side reflectors;
 - (4) Seat belts;
 - (5) Operational parking brake;
 - (6) Rearview mirror(s); and.
 - (7) "slow-moving-vehicle emblem" as defined by Texas Transportation Code § 547.703.
- (b) Equipment and its installation and maintenance must meet standards provided by the Texas Transportation Code or this ordinance, as amended.

Sec. 32-105. Required Equipment –NEV

- (a) A Neighborhood Electric Vehicle (NEV) must be equipped with the following equipment:
 - (1) Operational headlamps;
 - (2) Operational tail lamps;
 - (3) Side reflectors;
 - (4) Operational parking brake;

- (5) Rearview mirror(s);
- (6) Turn signals;
- (7) Horn;
- (8) Brake lights;
- (9) Seat belts;
- (10) Windshield; and
- (11) Vehicle identification number.
- (b) Equipment and its installation and maintenance must meet standards provided by the Texas Transportation Code or this ordinance, as amended.

Sec. 32-106. Required equipment—Off-Highway Vehicle

- (a) An Off-Highway Vehicle must be equipped with the following equipment as mandated by Texas Transportation Code§ 551A.071, as amended, and/or required by the City, to operate on permitted locations:
 - (1) a brake system maintained in good operating condition;
 - (2) an adequate muffler system in good working condition;
 - (3) a United States Forest Service Qualified spark arrester;
 - (4) a lighted headlight and taillight during the period from one-half hour after sunset to one-half hour before sunrise, and at any time when visibility is reduced because of insufficient light or atmospheric conditions; and
 - (5) attached to the back of the vehicle a triangular orange flat that is at least six feet above ground level.
- (b) Equipment and its installation and maintenance must meet standards provided by the Texas Transportation Code or this ordinance, as amended.

Sec. 32.107. Operator regulations

- (a) An Operator of a Golf Cart, NEV or Off-Highway Vehicle shall:
 - (1) Be licensed to Operate a motor vehicle as provided by Texas Transportation Code § 521.021, as amended, and carry a valid Driver's license as provided by Texas Transportation Code § 521.025. All state law Driver's license permissions and restrictions shall apply to the operation of a Golf Cart, NEV or Off-Highway Vehicle;

- (2) Abide by all state and local traffic regulations applicable to vehicular traffic;
- (3) Use standard hand signals for turning if the Operator's vehicle is not equipped with turn signals;
- (4) Not operate or park on areas not designated for vehicle use within City Parks;
- (5) Not use the vehicle to pull any object or person at any time;
- (6) Not exceed the seating capacity of the vehicle as designed by the manufacturer;
- (7) Wear a seat belt at all times while the vehicle is being operated;
- (8) Require each occupant of the vehicle to wear a seat belt at all times while the vehicle is being operated;
- (9) Remain seated at all times while the vehicle is in motion;
- (10) Require each occupant of the vehicle to remain seated at all times while the vehicle is in motion;
- (11) Not have or permit a passenger in the vehicle younger than eight years of age, or smaller than 4' 10" tall, without using an appropriate child safety seat system as defined by Texas Transportation Code § 545.412 (f)(I), except that a child allowed to use a booster seat in a passenger vehicle may be a passenger without a child restraint system (no booster seat required);
- (12) Maintain financial responsibility as defined in Texas Transportation Code § 601.051; and
- (11) Not allow an unlicensed Operator to operate the vehicle.
- (b) While operating a Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle upon a street in the City, the Driver shall comply with all laws applicable to motor vehicles as set forth in this article, the Texas Transportation Code, as amended, and other state and local laws. Such compliance shall include, without limitation, compliance with applicable parking laws and regulations. The Driver shall be subject to a citation for all violations of this article, the Texas Transportation Code, and other applicable state law.
- (c) A Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle is entitled to full use of a lane on the authorized streets and parking areas of the City.
- (d) The Driver shall not operate a Golf Cart, NEV or Off-Highway Vehicle between lanes of traffic or between adjacent lines or rows of vehicles.

- (e) A Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle shall not be used for the purpose of towing a trailer or vehicle of any kind, or a person, including, without limitation, a person on roller skates, skateboard, bicycle, or other wheeled device.
- (f) A person operating another vehicle upon a public street or highway or parking area in the City shall not operate such other motor vehicle in such a manner to deprive any Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle of the full use of a lane.

Sec. 32-108. Registration required.

The Owner of a Golf Cart, an Off-Highway Vehicle, or an NEV shall pay a registration fee in the amount set forth in the City's Schedule of fees and register the Golf Cart, Off-Highway Vehicle, or NEV with the City on the form provided by the City and including the following information:

- (a) License plate number,
- (b) VIN/Serial number,
- (c) Name of Owner,
- (d) Email address of Owner,
- (e) Address of Owner.
- (f) Telephone number of Owner,
- (g) Driver's license number of Owner,
- (h) State issuing Owner's driver's license,
- (i) Make and model of vehicle,
- (i) Color of vehicle,
- (k) Address where vehicle is kept, and
- (I) Name, address, and telephone number for insurance company issuing policy covering vehicle and policy number or other proof of financial responsibility.

Sec. 32-109. License plates required

- (a) A Golf Cart shall display a license plate issued under Section 551.402, Texas Transportation Code when Operated on a Street in a manner authorized by this Article.
- (b) An Off-Highway Vehicle shall display a license plate issued under Section 551A.052, Texas Transportation Code when Operated on a Street in a manner authorized by this Article.
- (c) An NEV shall display a license plate issued under Section 551.302, Texas Transportation Code when Operated on a Street in a manner authorized by this Article.

Sec. 32-110. Operation prohibited

- (a) A person shall not operate a Golf Cart or an Off-Highway Vehicle on any Street with a posted speed limit in excess of 35 miles per hour.
- (b) A person shall not operate an NEV on any Street with a posted speed limit in excess of 45 miles per hour.

Sec. 32-111. Speed limits

- (a) A person shall not Operate a Golf Cart on any Street at a speed greater than the lesser of (1) the posted speed limit or (2) twenty-five (25) miles per hour.
- (b) A person shall not operate an NEV or an Off-Highway Vehicle on any Street at a speed greater than the lesser of (1) the posted speed limit or (2) thirty-five (35) miles per hour.

Sec. 32-112. Hours of operation.

A person may operate a Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle on any Street during daytime and shall not operate a Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle on any Street during nighttime.

Sec. 32-113. Golf Carts, NEV, and Off-Highway Vehicles used for agriculture or utility purposes

A person may operate an unregistered Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle on a Street for agricultural or utility purposes as provided by Texas Transportation Code, Section 551A.057, as amended.

Sec. 32-114. Golf Carts, NEV, and Off-Highway Vehicles used for Governmental purposes

A person may operate an unregistered Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle on a Street for Governmental purposes.

Sec. 32-115. Liability

Nothing in this Article shall be construed as an assumption of liability by the City for any injuries to persons, animals, or property which may result from the operations of a Golf Cart, an NEV, or an Off-Highway Vehicle. The Owner of the Golf Cart, the NEV, or the Off-Highway Vehicle is fully accountable for the actions of any individual that the Owner grants permission to operate and drive said Golf Cart, NEV, or Off-Highway Vehicle, whether on private or public property. This described liability responsibility also applies to personal injuries or property damage resulting from operation of the Golf Cart, the NEV, or the Off-Highway Vehicle by a person under the age of twenty-one (21) years."

Section 3. Repealer. All ordinances and resolutions, or parts of ordinances and resolutions, in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed, and are no longer of any force and effect.

Section 4. Penalty. Any person who violates any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in an amount not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), as provided by Sec. 1-7, Richmond Code of Ordinances.

Section 5. Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance, shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions, or application thereof, of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable.

Section 6. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication.



SYNOPSIS

The City is always looking for opportunities to help fund much needed infrastructure upgrades. One that has been utilized by the City for many years is being a subrecipient to the County for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2016 GOALS ADDRESSED

Leverage public investment to enhance the existing community and promote growth.

BACKGROUND

The Department will be submitting an application on behalf of the City for Community Block Grant Funding for year 2024 for infrastructure improvements. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Grant Program is designed to provide assistance to wide ranging projects within neighborhoods that have low to moderate incomes. In Richmond, the only neighborhood that qualifies for this program is on the North side, census tract 6749. One of the categories eligible for funding assistance is infrastructure improvements. Projects are selected and coordinated through the Fort Bend County's Community Block Grant Development Department.


One of the Departments main concerns is Utility infrastructure. This month we will be submitting an application for grant funding for wastewater line rehabilitation. The grant request is for replacement of approximately 2,000 feet of gravity sewer line, new service leads for 47 homes, and replacement/rehab of 5 manholes on Douglas and Rochelle. These streets have been identified as problematic and susceptible to rainwater inflow and infiltration.

If authorized, we will be submitting the application for these upgrades for a total cost of \$383,818.71. The City's matching funds would be for engineering and 10% construction contingency estimated to be \$80,404.71. If approved the request for qualifications from engineering firms to design this project would go out in August or September of this year.

Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code authorizes state agencies and local governmental entities to enter into Interlocal Agreements for greater efficiency and effectiveness in the performance of their functions.

Chapter 706 of the Texas Transportation Code allows municipalities to contract with the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) to deny renewal of a driver license to a person who fails to appear for a complaint or citation or fails to pay or satisfy a judgment ordering payment of a fine and cost or in the manner ordered by the Court and such failure has been reported to DPS.

The City of Richmond and DPS desire to enter into an Interlocal Agreement for the Failure to Appear Program.

The City Commission of the City of Richmond deems it in the public interest to enter into the Interlocal Agreement with DPS for the Failure to Appear Program; **NOW, THEREFORE,**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF RICHMOND, TEXAS:

<u>Section 1.</u> The facts and recitations set forth in the preamble of this Resolution are hereby found to be true and correct.

<u>Section 2.</u> The City Commission of the City of Richmond approves the Interlocal Agreement with the Texas Department of Public Safety for the Failure to Appear Program and authorizes the City Manager to execute the same, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

Section 3. This Resolution shall repeal and replace Resolution No. 320-2020.

	Interlocal Cooperation Contract (Contract) is enterly of the State of Texas (DPS), an agency of the St

II. BACKGROUND

A peace officer authorized to issue citations within the jurisdiction of the Court must issue a written warning to each person to whom the officer issues a citation for a traffic law violation. This warning must be provided in addition to any other warnings required by law. The warning must state in substance that if the person fails to appear in court for the prosecution of the offense or if the person fails to pay or satisfy a judgment ordering the payment of a fine and cost in the manner ordered by the Court, the person may be denied renewal of the person's driver license.

As permitted under Tex. Transp. Code § 706.008, DPS contracts with a private vendor (Vendor) to provide and establish an automated Failure to Appear (FTA) system that accurately stores information regarding violators subject to the provisions of Tex. Transp. Code Chapter 706. DPS uses the FTA system to properly deny renewal of a driver license to a person who is the subject of an FTA system entry generated from an FTA Report.

An FTA Report is a notice sent by Court requesting a person be denied renewal of a driver's license in accordance with this Contract. The Court may submit an FTA Report to DPS's Vendor if a person fails to appear or fails to pay or satisfy a judgment as required by law. There is no requirement that a criminal warrant be issued in response to the person's failure to appear.

III. PURPOSE

This Contract applies to each FTA Report submitted by the Court to DPS or its Vendor and accepted by DPS or its Vendor.

IV. PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE

This Contract will be effective on the date of execution and terminate five years from that execution date unless terminated earlier in accordance with Section VII.C, *General Terms and Conditions*, *Termination*.

V. COURT RESPONSIBILITIES

A. FTA Report

For a matter involving any offense which a Court has jurisdiction of under Tex. Code Crim. Proc. Chapter 4, where a person fails to appear for a complaint or citation or fails to pay or

satisfy a judgment ordering payment of a fine and cost in the manner ordered by the Court, the Court will supply DPS, through its Vendor, an FTA report including the information that is necessary to deny renewal of the driver license of that person. The Court must make reasonable efforts to ensure that all FTA Reports are accurate, complete, and non-duplicative. The FTA Report must include the following information:

- 1. the jurisdiction in which the alleged offense occurred;
- the name of the court submitting the report;
- the name, date of birth, and Texas driver license number of the person who failed to appear or failed to pay or satisfy a judgment;
- 4. the date of the alleged violation;
- a brief description of the alleged violation;
- a statement that the person failed to appear or failed to pay or satisfy a judgment as required by law;
- 7. the date that the person failed to appear or failed to pay or satisfy a judgment; and
- any other information required by DPS.

B. Clearance Reports

The Court that files the FTA Report has a continuing obligation to review the FTA Report and promptly submit appropriate additional information or reports to the Vendor. The clearance report must identify the person, state whether or not a fee was required, and advise DPS to lift the denial of renewal and state the grounds for the action. All clearance reports must be submitted immediately, but no later than two business days from the time and date that the Court receives appropriate payment or other information that satisfies the person's obligation to that Court.

To the extent that a Court uses the FTA system by submitting an FTA Report, the Court must collect the statutorily required \$10.00 reimbursement fee from the person who failed to appear, pay or satisfy a judgment ordering payment of a fine and cost in the manner ordered by the Court. If the person is acquitted of the underlying offense for which the original FTA Report was filed or found indigent by the court, the Court will not require payment of the reimbursement fee.

Court must submit a clearance report for the following circumstances:

- the perfection of an appeal of the case for which the warrant of arrest was issued or judgment arose;
- 2. the dismissal of the charge for which the warrant of arrest was issued or judgment arose;
- the posting of a bond or the giving of other security to reinstate the charge for which the warrant was issued;
- the payment or discharge of the fine and cost owed on an outstanding judgment of the Court; or
- 5. other suitable arrangement to satisfy the fine and cost within the Court's discretion.

After termination of the Contract, the Court has a continuing obligation to report dispositions and collect fees for all violators in the FTA system at the time of termination. Failure to comply with the continuing obligation to report will result in the removal of all outstanding entries of the Court in the FTA Report, resulting in the lifting of any denied driver license renewal status from DPS.

C. Quarterly Reports and Audits

Court must submit quarterly reports to DPS in a format established by DPS.

Court is subject to audit and inspection at any time during normal business hours and at a mutually agreed upon location by the state auditor, DPS, and any other department or agency, responsible for determining that the Parties have complied with the applicable laws. Court must provide all reasonable facilities and assistance for the safe and convenient performance of any audit or inspection.

Court must correct any non-conforming transactions performed by the Court, at its own cost, until acceptable to DPS.

Court must keep all records and documents regarding this Contract for the term of this Contract and for seven years after the termination of this Contract, or until DPS or the State Auditor's Office (SAO) is satisfied that all audit and litigation matters are resolved, whichever period is longer.

D. Accounting Procedures

Court must keep separate, accurate, and complete records of the funds collected and disbursed and must deposit the funds in the appropriate municipal or county treasury. Court may deposit such fees in an interest-bearing account and retain the interest earned on such accounts for the Court.

Court will allocate \$6.00 of each \$10.00 reimbursement fee received for payment to the Vendor and \$4.00 for credit to the general fund of the municipal or county treasury.

E. Non-Waiver of Fees

Court will not waive the \$10.00 reimbursement fee for any person that has been submitted on an FTA Report, unless any of the requirements in Tex. Trans. Code § 706.006(a) or §706.006(d) are met.

Failure to comply with this section will result in: (i) termination of this Contract for cause; and (ii) the removal of all outstanding entries of the Court in the FTA Report, resulting in the lifting of any denied driver license renewal status from DPS.

F. Litigation Notice

The Court must make a good-faith attempt to immediately notify DPS in the event that the Court becomes aware of litigation in which this Contract or Tex. Transp. Code Chapter 706 is subject to constitutional, statutory, or common-law challenge, or is struck down by judicial decision.

VI. DPS's RESPONSIBILITIES

DPS will not continue to deny renewal of the person's driver license after receiving notice from the Court that the FTA Report was submitted in error or has been destroyed in accordance with the Court's record retention policy.

VII. PAYMENTS TO VENDOR

Court must pay the Vendor a fee of \$6.00 per person for each violation that has been reported to the Vendor and for which the Court has subsequently collected the statutorily required \$10.00 reimbursement fee. In the event that the fee has been waived by Tex. Trans. Code § 706.006(a) or §706.006(d), no payment will be made to the Vendor.

Court agrees that payment will be made to the Vendor no later than the last day of the month following the close of the calendar quarter in which the payment was received by the Court.

DPS will not pay Vendor for any fees that should have been submitted by a Court.

VIII. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- A. Compliance with Law. This Contract is governed by and construed under and in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas. The Court understands and agrees that it will comply with all local, state, and federal laws in the performance of this Contract, including administrative rules adopted by DPS.
- B. Notice. The respective party will send the other party notice as noted in this section. Either party may change its information by giving the other party written notice and the effective date of the change.

C. Termination.

Either party may terminate this Contract with 30 days' written notice.

DPS may also terminate this Contract for cause if Court doesn't comply with Section V.C., Quarterly Reports and Audits and V.E., Non-Waiver of Fees.

If either Party is subject to a lack of appropriations that are necessary for that Party's performance of its obligations under this Contract, the Contract is subject to immediate cancellation or termination, without penalty to either Party.

D. Amendments.

This contract may only be amended by mutual written agreement of the Parties.

E. Miscellaneous.

 The parties shall use the dispute resolution process provided for in Chapter 2260 of the Texas Government Code to resolve any disputes under this Contract; provided

however nothing in this paragraph shall preclude either Party from pursuing any remedies available under Texas law.

- 2. This Contract shall not constitute or be construed as a waiver of any of the privileges, rights, defenses, remedies, or immunities available to either Party or the State of Texas.
- Any alterations, additions, or deletions to the terms of the contract that are required by changes in federal or state law or regulations are automatically incorporated into the contract without written amendment hereto, and shall become effective on the date designated by such law or by regulation.

CERTIFICATIONS

The Parties certify that (1) the Contract is authorized by the governing body of each party; (2) the purpose, terms, rights, and duties of the Parties are stated within the Contract; and (3) each party will make payments for the performance of governmental functions or services from current revenues available to the paying party.

The undersigned signatories have full authority to enter into this Contract on behalf of the respective Parties.

SYNOPSIS

Effective March 1st, 2024, as required by Rule of Judicial Administration 7.1, every court must adopt a policy governing court confidentiality no later than May 1st, 2024.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN 2021 GOALS ADDRESSED

BACKGROUND

The confidentiality policy must: (1) define who it applies to, (2) define confidential information, (3) impose a duty of confidentiality on all court staff that continues after employment at the court ends, (4) address when, if ever, the disclosure of confidential information is authorized, (5) provide the language of relevant laws, (6) address negligent or accidental disclosure of confidential information, (7) warn of potential penalties for improper disclosure, and (8) require all court staff to acknowledge receipt of the policy in writing.

The policy must be provided to all new court staff. Policy must be given to all court staff including judges, prosecutors, bailiffs, clerks and court administrator, every two years.

MUNICIPAL COURT OF RICHMOND, TEXAS Confidentiality Policy and Agreement

Employees of this Court occupy positions of public trust. In the course of your duties, you will encounter confidential information about the prospective disposition of cases and the inner workings of the Court.

Preserving the confidentiality of the Court's documents and private deliberations is crucial to the Court's work. More specifically, confidentiality furthers the ability of judges and judicial staff to communicate openly and honestly and to reach the most legally correct outcomes for litigants. Confidentiality also builds public respect for the judiciary and impresses on others the gravity of the judicial process. Any breach of confidentiality would betray not only the Court and the individuals who work here, but also the public's interest in thorough, considered justice.

Confidentiality has long been an expectation within Texas courts. Canon 3B(10) of the Texas Code of Judicial Conduct demands that judges and court staff refrain from "public comment about a pending or impending proceeding which may come before the judge's court." Canon 3B(11) of the Texas Code of Judicial Conduct provides that "[t]he discussions, votes, positions taken, and writings of appellate judges and court personnel about causes are confidences of the court and shall be revealed only through a court's judgment, a written opinion or in accordance with Supreme Court guidelines for a court approved history project."

Texas Government Code Section 21.013 creates a Class A misdemeanor criminal offense for the unauthorized disclosure of non-public judicial work product, stating "[a] person with access to non-public judicial work product commits an offense if the person knowingly discloses, wholly or partly, the contents of any non- public judicial work product." Additionally, Texas Penal Code Section 39.06 criminalizes the misuse of official information by a public servant who "discloses or uses information for a nongovernmental purpose that: (1) he has access to by means of his office or employment; and (2) has not been made public", with penalties ranging from a Class C misdemeanor to a felony of the third degree.

This confidentiality policy incorporates the Canons as well as the statutory penalties of both Texas Government Code Section 21.013 and Texas Penal Code Section 39.06. This policy applies to all Court staff, including interns.

- 1. Protection of information. Confidential information must not be shared with persons not employed within the Court, except as provided in Section 3 below. Employees must refrain from commenting about cases that are or may come before the Court to family, friends, or acquaintances.
- 2. Confidential information defined. Confidential information includes:

- a) drafts of opinions not yet released, internal memoranda, emails between judges or staff, and any other document not intended for public use;
- b) conversations between judges or court staff about litigants or cases before, previously before, or expected to come before the Court;
- c) the private views of judges or court staff concerning the disposition of cases, litigants, anticipated cases, or each other;
- d) the authorship of per curiam opinions or orders, the timing of opinion or order release, and any other procedural mechanism not ordinarily public;
- e) documents properly filed under seal by litigants or counsel; and
- f) other information, however communicated, that is not authorized to be made public.

3. Disclosures of confidential information.

- a) **Intentional disclosure** of confidential information outside of the boundaries of (1) above may be met with maximum disciplinary action. See (5) below.
- b) **Negligent or accidental disclosure** is an extremely serious matter that may, but will not necessarily, be met with penalties as described in (5) below. Employees who accidentally disclose confidential information have a duty to promptly report the disclosure to their supervisor, appointing authority, or human resources department so that mitigation can be attempted.

Employees are expected to exercise their discretion and judgment to minimize the risk of inadvertent disclosure. For example, employees should refrain from communicating about sensitive matters in crowded or public spaces where others may overhear, even within the public areas of the Court. Employees should use court-issued, password-protected equipment to transmit confidential documents. Employees should be mindful of who can see their screen when working at home, on aircraft, public transit, or in public spaces. Employees should carefully keep track of and password protect electronic devices containing confidential information and immediately report any loss or theft of those devices.

- c) Authorized disclosure occurs when the Municipal Court Judge who supervises the employee authorizes the employee to share work product with a specific person or organization. For example, employees may be authorized to share draft rules or administrative orders with other judicial branch entities for review and comment before they are released to the public, and the Clerk of Court may be authorized to disclose information relating to case status as part of their job duties, provided the Court's internal, confidential deliberations are not disclosed.
- d) **Disclosure as necessary to report misconduct or illegal acts** is permitted. Employees may disclose confidential information when such disclosure is necessary to adequately report to an appropriate authority the misconduct or illegal acts of any person, including sexual or other forms of harassment.
- **4. Continuing confidentiality obligation.** An employee's duty to preserve confidentiality survives the employee's departure from the Court. An employee who leaves the Court has the same ongoing duty to protect confidential information that they had during their employment.

Further, the duty to protect information related to the disposition of cases, such as the substance of the Court's deliberations, persists even after an opinion or order is publicly released. Employees asked about a decision of the Court should offer no comment beyond a referral to the released opinion or order.

Finally, employees who depart from Court employment may not retain confidential materials. Employees should return or securely dispose of materials, such as in designated Court shredding bins, prior to an anticipated departure, or as soon as possible after an unanticipated departure.

- 5. **Penalties for unauthorized disclosure:** In the event of an unauthorized disclosure of confidential information, the Court will investigate the circumstances and take appropriate disciplinary action, as necessary. Potential disciplinary actions may include but are not limited to:
 - a) referral of the matter to the relevant law enforcement agency for investigation and prosecution. See Texas Government Code Section 21.013 and Texas Penal Code Section 39.06;
 - b) termination of employment;
 - c) for attorneys, referral to the State Bar of Texas or of other states for discipline and possible loss of the privilege to practice before Texas or other courts; and


